

Hakusan National Park

A trip to experience Mt. Hakusan Worship through Mino-Zenjodo



Known as one of Japan's three most famous sacred mountains alongside Mt. Fuji and Tateyama, Hakusan has been worshipped as a sacred mountain.The trails to the summit called Zenjodo were made by monks, and the trails from Echizen (Fukui), Kaga (Ishikawa), and Mino (Gifu) were called the Echizen-Zenjodo, Kaga-Zenjodo, and Mino-Zenjodo, respectively.



Nagataki Hakusanjinjya Shrine used to be the starting point of Mino-Zenjodo, where people left their horses before heading to Hakusan. Two giant Cedars welcome you as you walk through the approach to the shrine.

Coins at the roots of the tree? Japanese Cedar (*Cryptomeria japonica*) Trunk girth 1,207cm Height 35m Est. Age Unknown



This giant cedar is considered to be a result of 4 cedars merged, each of them with roughly 6m of trunk girth. There is a legend that coins, paid by people who stayed at the temple, were buried at the roots of the tree.

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Along the Mino-Zenjodo, there stand a giant Japanese Horse Chestnut. You can see some ruins of stone steps and walls here. You may get some imagination of the ancient age when Hakusan worship was at its prime.

There is a legend that Taicho Daishi, an Echizen priest who opened up Hakusan, left his cane, and it grew to this Cedar. This beautiful, divine Cedar requires 12 people to surround its trunk!





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Hakusan Chukyojinja Shrine used to be the staritng point of Mino-Zenjodo, like Nagataki Hakusan-jinja shrine. You can see giant Cedars as if they guard approach to the shrine. The one behind the hall of prayer is the largest, with 8.2m of trunk girth and 52m high.


[Nature of Hakusan]

Abundant in nature, you can see Beechdominated forests below 1,600m above sea level, and above it, more than 250 species of alpine and sub-alpine plants! As one of the highest levels of naturalness in Japan, the park has been designated as a Biosphere Reserve in accordance with the UNESCO Man and the Biosphere Programme (MAB).
