Peperpot, Chocopot, Weg naar Zee (all within half an hour drive from the capital Paramaribo); Powakka, Republiek, Zanderij and Colakreek (white sand forest 1 hr drive S of Paramaribo); Warappa Kreek (1 hr NE of Paramaribo by boat); Zintete-Fredberg Lodge & Fredberg (rainforest c 3.5 hrs S of Paramaribo) and Brownsberg (elevated rainforest c 2 hrs S of Paramaribo).


Introduction

Visiting Suriname, a former Dutch colony and the only tropical country where Dutch is spoken as a national language, was a dream come true! Not only because of the relaxed atmosphere, the great food, the absolute unparalleled forestedness of the country (at 94%!) or even the fantastic set of Guianan specialty birds – but rather the total package, combined with a week+ long stay at Fred Pansa's secluded and quiet Zintete-Fredberg Lodge (hereafter: Zintete Lodge). Especially with Venezuela now basically being a no-go for tourists, Suriname is a great way of getting acquainted with the Guianan specialties – and in Suriname, serviced by direct flights from e.g. Amsterdam and Miami, many of these are found within a four-hour drive from the capital Paramaribo (three hours from the Johan Adolf Pengel International Airport).

Highlights

In many of my previous birding tripreports I started this paragraph with "almost too many to mention ..." and this trip is no exception. Aside from just really wanting to visit the country Suriname, the mouthwatering array of Cotingas available (primarily at Zintete Lodge) was a big draw, and the trip didn't disappoint in that respect: we saw a total of 9 **Crimson Fruitcrows** (and heard a 10th), a pair of **Dusky Purpletuft**, 3 **Purple-breasted Cotingas** (2 males), 6 **Guianan Red Cotingas**, c 15 **Guianan Cock-of-the-rock** (at **two leks**), c 8 **Capuchinbirds** (**lekking** in two sites, one of which behind Zintete Lodge), c 25 Pompadour and c 13 Spangled Cotingas, 8 Purple-breasted Fruitcrows (and heard many more), 6 **Sharpbills** and well over 10 Screaming Pihas (hearing many, many more)!

Personally, I was also absolutely delighted with the wonderful views we had of a pair of **(Southern) Wing-banded Antbird**s, vigorously leaftossing only meters from us as if we weren't there – my most-wanted South American bird after seeing White-capped Tanager in Colombia in 2016.

The other 41 species of antbird (sensu latu) didn't disappoint either, nor did seeing 33 species of tanager (sensu latu), 18 species of parrot, 5 toucan(et)s, 6 jacamars, 14 woodpeckers (incl 5 range-restricted lifers: Arrow-headed & Golden-spangled Piculet, Blood-colored, Waved & Golden-collared Woodpecker). Scarlet Ibis, Zigzag Heron, Black Curassow, Grey-winged Trumpeter, Rufous Crab-Hawk, Spectacled, Crested & Black-banded Owl, Dusky & Caica Parrot, Lilac-tailed Parrotlet, Spotted & Collared Puffbird, Crimson Topaz, Tufted Coquette, Rufous-bellied, Guianan Streaked & Todd's Antwren, Black-throated Antshrike, Rufous-throated, White-plumed & Ferruginous-backed Antbird, Black, Crimson-hooded, White-throated & White-fronted Manakin, Glossy-backed Becard, Cayenne Jay and Red-billed Pied, Yellow-backed & Blue-backed Tanager complete the set of personal favorites.

Rarities encountered included the rarely-seen **White-throated Pewee** at Brownsberg (lifer for guide Fred Pansa, for us and for several birders that visited since our discovery, incl guide Otte)

and Amethyst Woodstar (new bird for Zintete), **Orange-breasted Falcon** at Fredberg and the ultra-localised **Boat-billed Tody-tyrant** at Zintete. Locally rare was also our sighting of two migrant/wintering Purple Martins at Chocopot near Paramaribo.

Non-feathered highlights were 31 species of dragonflies (Odonata) incl the third record of Erythemis carmelita for the Guyanas, the spectacular localised damselfly Heliocharis amazona, sev Ornate Helicopters Mecistogaster ornata, a copula of Gynacantha membranalis and the large gomphid Phyllogomphoides undulatus; Pale-throated Three-toed Sloth Bradypus tridactylus and six species of monkey incl Golden-handed Tamarin Saguinus midas; Yellow-footed Tortoise Chelonoides denticulata, (the snake) Boddaert's Tropical Racer Mastigodryas boddaerti, (the spectacular lizards) Goldenscale Anole Anolis chrysolepis, Black Tegu Tupinambis teguixin, Turniptailed Gecko Thecadactylus rapicauda and Rainbow Whiptail Cnemidophorus lemniscatus; (the spectacular frogs) Anomaloglossus baeobatrachus, Orange-legged Leaf Frog Phyllomedusa hypochondrialis, Tiger-striped Leaf Frog Callimedusa tomopterna and, best of all, Three-striped Poison Frog Ameerega t. trivittata, Guianan Shield Leaf Frog Rhinella lescurei, Oophagus Slenderlegged Tree Frog Osteocephalus oophagus and Small-mouthed Frog sp Chiasmocleis shudikarensis; dozens of species of mushrooms incl Lentinus bertieri, L. tigrinus and L. crinitus, the unique genus Caripia montagnei, the stunning Favolus brasiliensis, Calocera cornea, Dacryopinax spathularia, Leucocoprinus fragilissimus, Ceratiomyxa fruticulosa, Schizophyllum commune, Cyathus olla and, best of all, Phallus indusiatus, along with 1,000's of tiny Marasmius on the forest floor; the spectacular moths Arsenura ponderosa quianensis, Adhemarius gannascus and Trosia nigropunctigera; and bugs Paryphes flavocinctus and Acanthocephala sp. sov. (nr. granulosa).

Trip totals

We recorded 420 birds, of which 13 were heard-only [**HO**]; the number of birds seen only includes one introduced species (House Sparrow). Among these 420 we recorded c 65 range-restricted (Guianan) species (**RR**), incl the former Suriname endemic (Arrowhead (Guianan) Piculet, now also found in Guyana), and c 67 range-restricted (Guianan) subspecies (**RRs**).

I saw 112 lifers, the others more. This tipped my total of life birds seen just over the 6,666-mark (based on IOC list v8.1).

Most noticeable dips

The range-restricted species we searched hardest for but failed to see were Band-tailed Antshrike, Red-and-black Grosbeak, White Bellbird and Pale-bellied Mourner (the latter was heard-only, hereafter: HO). We also tried for birds like Ringed Antpipit, White-crested & Golden-crowned Spadebill, Ringed Woodpecker and Red-billed Woodcreeper without encountering any. Harpy is seen at Zintete Lodge c 5x a year but we didn't see one. Given the nature of birding in tropical rainforest, with several specialties roaming over vast areas, I think we did a pretty decent job. Returning for the birds (and snakes & frogs!) we missed this trip won't be hard at all!

Visa / tourist card

Dutch and most EU, USA and UK citizens best collect a tourist card pretrip, which costs € 30. Dutch people can get this at the Suriname consulate in Amsterdam [De Cuserstraat 11, 1081 CK, Amsterdam; **Ph** +31 (0)20-642 6717 or 6137; opening hours Mon-Fri 9 am until 2 pm], or at the special desk at Amsterdam Schiphol Airport [found at Departure Hall 3, between entry gates B and C; it opens two hours prior to check-in of all KLM and SLM departures to Suriname; it's closed on Mondays]. To obtain a tourist card, one only has to present a return ticket and a passport valid for six months when entering Suriname (no photo or visa form needed). The site http://consulaatsuriname.nl/ presents a listy of 50 countries whose citizens are eligible for a tourist

card. The tourist card is meant for holidayers only, and is valid for 90 days max. Upon entering the country the tourist card is valid for 30 days; it can be renewed in Suriname for an extra 60 days.

NOTE that a tourist card is meant for one-entry only. People who need multiple entries (for example those who want to combine visiting Suriname with a trip to Guyana) need to get a visa.

Surinames Johan Adolf Pengel International Airport (hereafter: the airport) has a desk for purchasing a tourist card upon arrival, but this takes extra time (on top of the already time-consuming process of entering the country).

Money

Suriname has its own currency, the Suriname dollar. At the time of travel/writing, 1 EUR (€) was worth c 8.5 SUR\$. Many banks at the airport and in downtown Paramaribo (the capital) have ATM's, but not all take Cirrhus/Maestro debet cards. We found that DSB (De Surinaamse Bank) did; at most other banks we could only get money using MasterCard. The daily limit is 2,000 SUR\$ ($c \in 250$).

We brought some cash EURos, to pay guide Otte and our rental car. The money we owed Fred for our stay at Zintete Lodge we'd paid in advance on his Dutch bank account.

Time

Since the country is located quite far east in South America, the time in Suriname is only three hrs less than in London, or four less than Amsterdam (five in the European summer).

Guides

We used two bird guides: Otte Ottema and Fred Pansa.

Otte Ottema owns the website www.planktonik.birdinginsuriname.com, containing info about what birds are best found where. Otte is Dutch and has lived in Suriname since 1990. He is coauthor of Field Guide to the Birds of Suriname. He has a wide experience guiding in Suriname, and offers guided tours of the country, including sites around Paramaribo, several coastal sites (incl Warappa Kreek) and Colakreek, Powakka & Zanderij (white-sand forest and so-called 'savanna'). Although Otte is now 66 (2018), he has a vast knowledge about what is best found where, and also knows the sounds well. He prefers to sit down somewhere and listen out for the sounds of the specialties one's after, as opposed to covering large distances. Otte's e-mail is **E** otteottema@gmail.com.

We used Otte's services for one day at <u>Colakreek, Powakka & Zanderij</u> (only missing Pale-bellied Mourner, HO, and Smoky-fronted Tody-flycatcher – both of which we also missed with Fred), seeing specialties like Bronzy Jacamar, Rufous-crowned Elaenia, (Point-tailed) Palmcreeper and Glossy-backed Becard. Since we provided our own transportation (rental car), Otte charged us € 30 each for this tour. He also organised and guided our <u>Warappa Kreek tour</u>, where we saw numerous Rufous Crab-hawk, as well as specialties like Scarlet Ibis, Spot-breasted & Blood-colored Woodpecker, Pale-tipped Inezia and Plain-bellied Emerald. For the Warappa Kreek tour we each paid € 110.

If the tide is right (incoming) the Warappa Kreek tour can, for an additional fee, be extended with a visit to Suriname river mouth to see Guiana (Estuarine) Dolphins Sotalia (fluviatilis) guianensis.

Fred Pansa is the owner of <u>Zintete-Fredberg Lodge</u> and guides to nearby <u>Fredberg</u>, locations that should feature high on all birding visits to Suriname, as the pristineness of the forest is unparalleled, the number of both species and numbers of cotingas, parrots and antbirds is astonishing and the birding is downright excellent! Fred also guides throughout Suriname. Even though he only started birding as recent as 2014, Fred is an extremely good guide, not only by sight and sound, habits and habitats, but he is also keen to make one's stay as pleasant as possible. For instance, whenever we exited the forest after a walk, he would always have a good supply of cold coke, water, juice and biscuits in his van. He is thoroughly recommended! Fred can be contacted through Facebook, at **E** fredecotours@hotmail.com or at **Ph** +597 894 8661.

As a tour to Zintete-Fredberg Lodge typically starts from Paramaribo in early morning, it makes sense to spend the first hours of birding along the way, for example in the Colakreek, Powakka & Zanderij areas that are more or less along the way. Alternatively, one could head straight for either Zintete Lodge or Brownsberg from Suriname's Johan Adolf Pengel International Airport, located at Zanderij, which is an hour closer to both sites than the capital (leaving Paramaribo and the necessary sites for the coastal specialties for the end of one's trip).

Sean Dilrosun is another very knowledgeable birdguide who guided, for example, Arjan Dwarshuis when he visited Suriname during his Biggest Year in 2016. Arjan, Otte and Fred speak very highly of Sean's birding and guiding abilities. Sean, who, like Fred, guides all over Suriname, can be contacted through Facebook, at **E** seandil@hotmail.com or at **Ph** +597 827 2021. Sean is fluent in English.

For insects it is possible to hire **Auke Hielkema**. He has his own light set-up to attract good numbers and variety of moths, beetles and other insects, especially at Brownsberg. Auke also knows his way around reptiles & amphibians, plants and some mushrooms (but no birds). Auke can be contacted through Facebook, at **E** groenhart@yahoo.com or at **Ph** +597 872 89018.

All guides are fluent in Dutch (native speakers) and, so I'm told, in English. In his own words, Fred knows enough English to name the birds and explain where they are (he also uses a laserpointer). Both Fred and Sean also speak all local Suriname languages.


Orientation

From the maps below you can tell we only birded the northeastern quarter of Suriname, all sites easily reached by (saloon) car. Numbers (of visited sites) are explained in detail under map 2. As a quick reference, on map 1 the international airport is located next to Zanderij (1), which is an hour's drive south of the capital Paramaribo (2) and an hour's drive north of Brownsberg (12). The southwesternmost point we birded is Fredberg (11) in the Zintete-Fredberg Lodge area, which is c 2.5 hours drive south of the international airport and c 3.5 hours drive south of Paramaribo.

LODGING

We only stayed in four locations (five when counting the top of Fredberg as separate) in two weeks.

Paramaribo

Our first five nights in Paramaribo we stayed at <u>AlbergoAlberga B&B</u> (GPS 5.82659082, -55.15354119), located in an old wooden house in the old wooden quarter near Suriname river. This is only a few mins walk from some of the major tourist sites (Fort Zeelandia, the presidential palace etc), as well as sev good eateries along the river's edge (Waterkant) and elsewhere. The cost was € 32 per twin room per night (fan); one pays a bit more for a room with A/C. Small as it may be, AlbergoAlberga has a welcoming swimming-pool. Bicolored Conebill has been seen in its tiny garden.

Our last night of the trip we stayed at **Eco Resort Inn** (GPS 5.82981418, -55.14401934) in Paramaribo, part of the Torarica complex of three of the best hotels in town. A (modern) twin room with A/C and elaborate breakfast cost c € 70 per night. The Eco Resort Inn is located c 500m northeast of the center of town, along the river's edge. The garden makes for nice birding, best birds recorded being Bicolored Conebill, Rufous-sided Crake (HO), Yellow-chinned Spinetail, Ashyheaded Greenlet, feeding Semipalmated Sandpipers and major roost migration of egrets, mainly Little Blue Heron, past its small shoreline. The swimming-pool was being repaired when we stayed, but Eco Resort Inn guests can also use the (more expensive) old and new Torarica Hotels' facilities, less than 10 mins walk away. We used their bus service to the airport at 15 US\$ per person, this taking 1.5 hr.

Inland, rainforest

The wooden Zintete-Fredberg Lodge (GPS 4.635, -55.420) was built by Fred Pansa in early 2017, and consists of a communal building (incl kitchen, dining tables, dormitory, river viewing deck and charging facility); c. four separate wooden huts, each containing three beds (with mosquito nets) with en-suite toilet; and a separate toiletblock where the (cold) showers are located. The lodge is found next to a small river that, in Nov 2017, held little water. The entrance road is found c 55 km south of Brownsweg (a town 90 km due south of Paramaribo) and is marked "Lumprex 726" on a white wooden sign. Take this unpaved (good) road c 17 km westwards until, roughly 300m before a guarded gate, a small track veers into the forest to your left (south). This turn-off is not signposted; follow this track through the forest for c 900m to finally reach the lodge. The lodge is surrounded by excellent primary tropical rainforest, entered by several small trails (see Visited sites on p. 29 for an idea of what birds occur). The lodge currently (2017) receives about 50/50% birders and 'normal tourists', the latter mostly Dutch students doing some kind of internship in Suriname (we met aspiring teachers, GP's and biologists), but Fred hopes to change that number to 80/20 in the future. Birding packages to Zintete Lodge include an optional night's stay at the top of Fredberg and Fred's (or another guide's) guiding throughout, and are therefore more expensive than 'normal tours'.

Even though many interesting birds are found around the lodge (incl Zigzag Heron, Boat-billed Tody-tyrant, Crimson Topaz, Capuchinbird, Spectacled Owl, Rufous-capped Antthrush, Yellow-billed & Great Jacamar), the best birding is found driving further west over the logging road, beyond the guarded gate. There's however no access beyond the guarded gate for independent birders. All visiting birders are therefore strongly recommended to contact Fred to see what their options are.

Fredberg (GPS 4.644, -55.495) is a large rock located 275m above the rainforest, with a truly magnificent view in all directions. It is reached by an ascending 4-km-long trail, after driving 8 kms from Zintete Lodge. Fredberg is basic and consists of two shelters, one harbouring c 8 hammocks and one a kitchen and dining table. There is also a cold shower. We spent one night in a hammock but as we weren't used to sleeping in one, we did not have a good night's sleep. The birding along the access trail (that can also be done while staying at Zintete Lodge), our visit to the Guianan Cock-of-the-rock lek at the top of Fredberg in early morning and the view from the top made our visit definitely worthwhile however.

Brownsberg (GPS 4.949, -55.181) is one of the best birding sites in Suriname, and easily reached by road c two hrs south of Paramaribo. However, parts of the ascending unsurfaced access road are steep, narrow and muddy (more so when it rains), so a 4WD or sturdy car is recommended to reach your destination (Fred drove us up in his van). On top of Brownsberg there's a small settlement consisting of several simple places to stay and a simple but adequate restaurant. We stayed at **Tapir Lodge**, a one-storey building with several bunk-bedded rooms, a spacious living-room and a kitchen located 100m from the restaurant, at the edge of Brownsberg with a matching grand view of the lower-lying surroundings (incl Brokopondo Lake). A large fig-like tree (*Clusia grandiflora*) in front of our window attracted large numbers of fruit-eating birds (and monkeys) each morning, incl Sharpbill and Waved Woodpecker. Sometimes, as happened in other parts of Brownsberg settlement, a flock of Grey-winged Trumpeter would walk across our lawn. The light bulbs at the restaurant, the house next to it and the small outhouse behind it attracted interesting and occasionally spectacular moths at night.

Package deal Zintete Lodge, Fredberg & Brownsberg combined: we paid Fred c € 1,000 each (party of four) for eight nights at Zintete Lodge (incl a night at Fredberg) and three nights at Brownsberg. This amount included all accommodation, transportation (from and to our hotels in Paramaribo), all food, hot and soft drinks, water and snacks while at Zintete, entrance fee to Brownsberg and Fred's guiding (day and night, as we pleased). We paid for our own food & drinks at Brownsberg (cheap) and Chris, Gerjon and Garry purchased some beer to bring to Zintete Lodge (Fred and I don't drink alcohol).

Food & drinks

Everywhere in Suriname, the food was good to excellent. Roti, kouseband, baka bana, sauto etc are amongst many Dutch people's favorites – and here one can eat them every day! The cook at Zintete Lodge served great food with surprisingly great variety. At Brownsberg, the small café-and-restaurant served one fairly simple meal each night. We ate a couple of times at Warung Kartini in Zanderij, a stone's throw from the airport; here, the food was also great. Roopram, a chain of roti restaurants/take-away with several shops in Paramaribo, is also highly recommended.

Beer (incl the local Parbo and international types such as Heineken) and soft drinks are widely available. In the Zintete Lodge package deal, hot drinks, water and soft drinks were included, but beer had to be bought and brought in by oneself. In Paramaribo, water from the tap is safe to drink (we did and experienced no trouble at all).

Internet & cell phone coverage

Cell phone coverage was good in and around Paramaribo, Zanderij and Brownsberg, non-existent at Zintete Lodge and OK from the very top of Fredberg.

Both AlbergoAlberga B&B and Eco Resort Inn (in Paramaribo) had good wifi, whereas Zintete Lodge, Fredberg and Brownsberg had none.

Electricity

An internet search revealed that in Suriname supposedly the American, type A electrical plug (with two small flat pins, 110 volts), is used. However, in all places we stayed we found European, type C electrical plug (220 volts) sockets, so we didn't need adapters. Multiple sockets or multiple usb-chargers came in handy, as we frequently charged multiple appliances (cellphone, camera battery, JBL Clip speaker, torch, powerbank etc).

At Zintete Lodge there is no electricity. However, our wooden cottages had one light each that worked well. The generator is turned on for about 1.5 hours each night, so that all electric equipment can be charged. On top of Fredberg, there are no charging options.

Equipment used

Aside from our bins, we brought:

- birdsounds from xeno-canto, on our smartphones (iPhone and Samsung);
- a JBL Clip 2 speaker (€ 49 at Dutch websites CoolBlue or MediaMarkt), which sets a new standard in playback: it weighs 184 gr, is water resistant, measures 14x9x4 cm, plays sound for up to 8 hrs, has a mountaineer's clip (to attach it to a branch, or to one's belt), has great sound quality with high volume, and works with Bluetooth up to 10m away;
- two telescopes (Swarowski ATS 65 and Swarowski ATM 80 with 25-50x wide angle), complemented by Fred's surprisingly good Landove scope;
- two larger cameras (Canon EOS 7D mark II with Canon EF 300 f/4L IS USM (Gerjon) and Canon EF 400 f/5.6L USM (Garry) lenses, respectively) and two pocket cameras incl a Lumix DMC-TZ40 (Gerjon's, that I used);
- a green laserpointer (Fred also has one);
- sev good torches; and
- sev powerbanks.

Dangers & annoyances

Suriname is a very safe country, and we really were at ease wherever we went. However, the capital Paramaribo appears to have a few areas where it's best not to wander around at night. We avoided these areas (ask your hotel staff where they are).

The only annoyances we experienced were

- mosquitos primarily in Warappa Kreek, where they were quite a nuisance when our boat wasn't moving; however, burning incense (that Otte brought) helped a bit;
- a few ticks at Zintete Lodge;
- grass lice at Peperpot.

Nothing a bit of DEET won't be able to fix.

Temperatures & weather

As with most tropical countries, daytime temperatures in Suriname usually varied between 26 and 32 C, only dropping to c 24 C at night. Usually, using a sheet in the middle of the night was handy as then it would be significantly colder (but still over 20 C). On top of Fredberg, as well as on Brownsberg (300m and 575m, respectively), it was cooler in the evening, night and morning. A light sweater could come in handy at Brownsberg (depending of course how easy you chill), and so could proper pj's or thermal underwear for the night in the hammock at Fredberg.

Much to our surprise the birding stayed excellent even after the first two hours of day (when obviously the birding was most pleasant, temperature-wise as well as bird-activity being the highest). We would frequently encounter mixed-species-flocks at all times of day (at Zintete and Brownsberg; Peperpot didn't have mixed flocks on our visits), while at fruiting trees there were always birds present. For example, we found one tree (not fruiting, though there was a fruiting tree nearby) that held 5 Crimson Fruitcrows (and 8 Pompadour & 2 Spangled Cotingas) at 1.30 pm! Along the wide and quiet logging road near Zintete-Fredberg Lodge, there were always plenty of Paradise & Brown Jacamars, Swallow-winged Puffbirds, raptors and quite frequently parrots or cotingas to look at, at any time of day ...

Our visit coincided with the start of the 'small rainy season', which in our case meant we had downpours on our last two days (each lasting 15-20 mins only). On some other days we had a few drops of rain but nothing to lose birding time over. The 'large rainy season' basically lasts from April to mid-July, during which there's heavy rain at night and occasionally during the day. During 'large rainy season' all Guianan avian specialties are present and as easily seen as at other times of year; numbers of frogs and dragonflies encountered are higher at that time of year though.

Timing of trip

Our visit was timed during the lekking period of two of our most sought-after cotingas: Guianan Cock-of-the-rock and Capuchinbird, and we were not disappointed in that respect! These cotingas lek from Nov-late Dec. Friends of us whose visit overlapped with ours, even saw a singing White Bellbird at Brownsberg at November 14.

Most, if not all, Suriname avian specialties are resident, and can therefore be found at any time of year (especially with an experienced bird guide).

NOTE that April-August is a good time for Leatherback Turtle *Dermochelys coriacea* (as well as four other species of sea turtle), whose nesting beaches are found at Galibi, in NE Suriname.

Birdable habitats

Read these staggering percentages: Suriname has 15.3 million hectares of forest covering approximately 94% of the country's surface area (FAO, 2015). 91.4% of Suriname's forest area is primary forest, 8.5% is naturally regenerated and only 0.1% planted! We therefore mainly birded in primary rainforest (Zintete, Brownsberg), at remnants of coastal primary rainforest and nearby second-growth (Peperpot, Chocopot), white-sand forest (Powakka, Zanderij, Republiek, Colakreek, Colakreek), mudflats (Weg naar Zee, Torarica Hotel), mangrove (Warappa Kreek) and gardens bordering the Suriname River in the capital Paramaribo (Eco Resort Inn, Torarica Hotel).

International flight

We flew KLM direct, Amsterdam – Paramaribo, for c € 850 (I paid with airmiles + € 130 in taxes). Flying time in the KLM Boeing 747 was c 8h30m to, and 8h from Paramaribo. Both flights were uneventful; even though we departed about an hour late on both flights, we still made our ETA's.

NOTE that Suriname flights take longer than usual to check-in, drop-off and board, and so it is mandatory to check in no later than 1.5 hr prior to the flight (preferably, 2.5-3 hrs prior) in both Amsterdam and Suriname.

Getting into the country was a bit of a hassle. There were three officials for people with a Suriname passport, three for people with other passports, and one for VIP's, crew and people over 60 years old. It took us an hour to pass the passport check. Grabbing our luggage and getting out the door only took 15 mins though.

From Amsterdam, the Netherlands, Suriname is serviced by direct flights from KLM (flights on Tue, Thu, Sat & Sun), SLM-Surinam Airways (Mon, Wed, Fri, Sun) and, since June 1, 2017, the holiday carrier TUI (flights on all days except Tue and Thu). As tickets are usually in high demand because of the large number of people of Suriname origin living in the Netherlands, prices of tickets are relatively high; around \in 810 (KLM) or \in 710 (SLM) outside high season (like in Nov, when the cotingas lek), rising to c twice as much in high seasons (Christmas and European summer holiday).

Surinam Airways also has a direct flight from Miami (flights on all days except Wed & Sun, c \$ 600 return) and Caribbean Airlines flies from Tobago (c \$ 400 return).

NOTE that TUI and KLM offer the possibility of a stop-over in the Dutch Antilles after one's Suriname trip, thus making it easier to sell this trip to a non-birding spouse (Suriname doesn't have proper beaches, but the Dutch Antilles surely do).

Rental car

Our car rental agency Compa International didn't have an office at the airport but nevertheless delivered the car to the airport, and collected it from our Paramaribo accommodation the evening prior to departure for Zintete. Compa International can be reached at **E** info@compainternational.com.

To rent a car in Suriname, Westerners do not need to present an international driver's license.

We were given a car with the tank half-full, and turned the car in with a tank half-full.

We paid € 228 for four days (incl full insurance and collecting fees, excluding € 100 deposit), for a 4WD RAV4. We pair € 50 in advance on a Dutch bank account, and the remainder in cash at the airport upon collecting the car. The car was fine, except for a persistent glare over the front window that made driving in the dark problematic (especially given the lack of street lights or reflecting paint on countryside roads). We only drove in the dark one early morning though (towards Powakka, with Otte). The glare could not be removed by A/C, repeated use of water and/or a towel. I later learned this problem is easily fixed by cutting a potatoe in half and rubbing the cut part over the window – so now you know what to bring!

Road conditions & driving hints

Roads are not too bad in Suriname. They don't have lights, metal shoulders or reflectors though, and frequently there is no indication between or beside lanes. Max speed limit outside cities is 60 km/hr (inside cities 40 km/hr), and I didn't feel the need to drive faster.

In Suriname one drives on the left (like in Britain, Australia and Malaysia). People coming from the left have the right of way. Cars on a roundabout have the right of way over traffic entering the roundabout. In my experience, everyone abided by international traffic rules and moreover, people in general drive slow and courteous. Even though the road between the airport (1 hr due south of the capital Paramaribo) and Paramaribo is a main street (in the sense that once on it one has the right of way), people would frequently stop and let other traffic in.

Paramaribo knows few traffic lights, elsewhere there are none. One-way streets are frequent in Paramaribo. Rush hour is a pain, with especially the road over the high Jules Wijdenbosch bridge over Suriname river (connecting the capital with Commewijne province east of the river) being very crowded. The road connecting (the airport at) Zanderij and Paramaribo can also get congested; for example, driving from the airport to the capital took us 2.5 hrs (instead of 1) in the evening of Nov 26.

Suriname basically has few roads and no highways as such. There are two major roads going south, one of which ends up at a river (after c 200 km), after which the only possibility to go any further is by boat. Furthermore, there are roads along the coast going west, and east of Paramaribo, to (formerly British) Guyana and French Guiana, respectively. Outerlying parts of the country are serviced by small aircraft, departing from domestic airport Zorg en Hoop (that apparently also offers international flights to Georgetown, capital of neighbouring Guyana).

DAY-BY-DAY & best sightings

Sun Nov 26 Amsterdam to Paramaribo

Departed Schiphol Amsterdam Airport with KLM at 1.30 pm (45 mins late), arriving at Johan Adolf Pengel International Airport at Zanderij at 4.25 pm after an uneventful 8.5 hr direct flight. Getting through the passport check took an hour. Both our fellow traveller Chris, who'd been in Suriname with his spouse for 10 days, and the car rental representative were waiting for us. Checking the pre-rented RAV4 in the parking lot and signing papers was a swift occasion, and off we went to Paramaribo – only to arrive in the dark, after 2.5 hrs of congested traffic. Checked into AlbergoAlberga B&B and had dinner at a food stall of Waterkant, alongside Suriname river.

Mon Nov 27

Peperpot, Chocopot, Weg naar Zee

We started the day at the old Dutch cocoa plantation of <u>Peperpot</u> at 6.30 am (dawn). Incl the crossing of the tall Jules Wijdenbosch bridge to the eastern shore of Suriname river, getting to Peperpot took about half an hour from our b&b in the center of Paramaribo. Since we thought the trailhead on the eastern end of Peperpot was closed on Mondays (this now changed, see Visited sites), we drove to the western side of Peperpot where we birded along the quiet road parallel to the eastern edge of Suriname river, finding coastal specialties incl **Arrowhead Piculet**, **Blood-colored Woodpecker**, **Slender-billed Kite** and Black-crested Antshrike, as well as Cinnamon Attila, a displaying pair of (Black-capped) **Donacobius**, a very confiding singing male **Silvered Antbird** and three trip-exclusives White-shouldered Tanager, Yellow Oriole & **Lesson's Seedeater**. We had lunch at <u>Eco Resort Inn</u>, Paramaribo (1-2.15 pm)(and made reservations for our last night of the trip), and then drove on towards Chocopot, another deserted cocoa plantation.

As the birding at <u>Chocopot</u> was a bit slow (apart from two brilliant males **Crimson-hooded Manakin**) we continued towards Weg naar Zee, finding a nice **Pale-throated Three-toed Sloth**hanging in an open *Cecropia* tree, with a male **Long-winged Harrier** hunting in the fields below.

At the mudflats along <u>Weg naar Zee</u> (5-5.45 pm) we were surprised to see a flock of **Scarlet Ibis**, as well as our first, distant, **Rufous Crab-Hawk**. We also enjoyed the many waders, mostly Semipalmated Sandpipers. Stayed at AlbergoAlberga B&B.

Tue Nov 28

Powakka, Zanderij, Colakreek

We departed our b&b at 5 am, to pick up guide Otte Ottema at his house in the southern part of Paramaribo (20 mins drive). We then continued towards Powakka, to arrive at around 6.30 am, just after first light. In a patch of white-sand forest near Powakka we connected with specialties Bronzy Jacamar, Southern White-fringed Antwren, Rufous-crowned Elaenia, Red-billed Channel-billed Toucan and Green-tailed Goldenthroat, but unfortunately dipped Pale-bellied Mourner. Close to Powakka we also had fabulous views of lekking Black Manakin, and denser & taller white-sand forest further S of Powakka produced Spotted Puffbird, Saffron-crested Tyrant-Manakin and Northern (Guianan) Slaty-Antshrike. We had lunch at Zanderij and drove round the nearby airport for some open-country birds like Burrowing Owl (only site in Suriname), Red-breasted Blackbird and Ruddy-breasted Seedeater. Our afternoon was spent at Colakreek, where best birds seen were Glossy-backed Becard, (Point-tailed) Palmcreeper, Dusky-chested Flycatcher, Northern Red-shouldered & Red-bellied Macaw. We dipped Smoky-fronted Tody-flycatcher however. At night, had dinner with Fred (our guide as of Dec 1) and three Dutch friends who'd just returned from Fred- and Brownsberg. Stayed at AlbergoAlberga B&B.

Wed Nov 29 Warappa Kreek

Guide Otte collected us with a rental van and driver at our b&b at 5 am and drove us to a boatlanding NE of Paramaribo, where our chartered motorised boat departed around 5.30 am. Departing in the dark, we drove for about 1.5 hour, first crossing Suriname River, then east into a wide creek and finally north into Warappa Kreek. At dawn, 100+ Orange-winged Amazons (pairs and small flocks) flew over the wide creek along with herons, kingfishers and swallows. We stopped at Bakkie restaurant between 7-8 am, where we encountered Plain-bellied Emerald, Spotted Tody-flycatcher and Great Antshrike, before heading deeper into the mangroves. Lowish tide meant frequent stops at narrow spots in the creek to wait before we could continue – a good way to watch birds (of which there were few and far apart) but a nuisance with the many mosquitoes.

Although we did see specialties **Rufous Crab-Hawk** (19), **Pale-tipped Inezia**, **Blood-colored**, **Crimson-crested**, **Cream-colored & Spot-breasted Woodpecker** (the latter three tripexclusives), Black-crested Antshrike and **Crimson-hooded Manakin**, I recommend this trip only for those who need to see any of the target birds mentioned. At 1 pm we reached the lagoon just south of the beach, where indeed we saw a small flock of **9 Scarlet Ibis** roosting in mangrove trees, as well as dozens of Yellow-crowned Night Herons on the mud. After having lunch at the narrow beach we headed back, again with a stop at Bakkie. Since the tide was not right (outgoing instead of incoming) we didn't stand a chance of seeing Guiana (Estuarine) Dolphins *Sotalia* (*fluviatilis*) *guianensis*. Dinner with our Dutch friends. Stayed at AlbergoAlberga B&B.

Thu Nov 30 Peperpot

Back to Peperpot, now birding the eastern end of the trail (starting behind the office). We specifically looked for, but dipped on, Amazonian Royal Flycatcher, nesting along the trail according to Otte (but later found we'd been looking in the wrong place). Best birds seen include **Crimsonhooded Manakin**, **Arrowhead Piculet**, Chestnut & **Blood-colored Woodpecker**, **Little Hermit**, **Spotted Puffbird**, **Guianan Trogon**, Blackish & **Black-chinned Antbird**, **Guianan & Olivegreen Tyrannulet**, Yellow-throated Flycatcher, **Painted Tody-flycatcher** (giving us the runaround for 45 mins!) and Ochre-lored Flatbill. Stayed at AlbergoAlberga B&B.

Fri Dec 1 Paramaribo to Zintete Lodge via Zanderij and Colakreek Fred picked us up with his van at our b&b in early morning and we drove straight to some forest patches near Republiek where we soon found new birds such as Golden-collared Woodpecker, Golden-spangled Piculet, Golden-sided Euphonia, Black-spotted Barbet, Dusky Parrot & Cayenne Jay. Very nice were also the good views we had of Golden-handed Tamarin, a small monkey, a roadside Tayra pausing for a while and of a pair of displaying Purple-throated Fruitcrow both collecting nesting material. On one of several more stops, incl a repeat-dip at the Smoky-fronted Tody-flycatcher, we connected with our first Little Chachalaca, finally arriving at Zintete Lodge at dusk. Stayed at Zintete-Fredberg Lodge.

Sat Dec 2 Zintete-Fredberg Lodge

Departed the lodge at 6.10 am, proceeded through the guarded gate and drove c 15 km further west through the rainforest. We encountered no other traffic. Highlights today included **7 Crimson Fruitcrows**, **1p Purple-breasted Cotinga**, **Waved Woodpecker**, **Guianan Toucanet**, Blackheaded Parrot & **Painted Parakeet** (8 sp of parrot in total today), Yellow-backed & **Blue-backed Tanager**, **Tiny Tyrant-Manakin**, **Tufted Coquette**, **6 Crimson Topaz**, **McConnell's Spinetail**, **Todd's & Spot-tailed Antwren** (out of a total of 22 lifers for me). Other species of interest included **13 Pompadour & 6 Spangled Cotingas**, a confiding pair of **Red-and-green Macaw**, Red-necked & Yellow-tufted Woodpecker. Stayed at Zintete-Fredberg Lodge.

Sun Dec 3 Zintete-Fredberg Lodge

After trying for Zigzag Heron behind the lodge (without result), we went birding in the rainforest. Interesting creatures encountered today include Scarlet Macaw, Red-fan & Caica Parrot, Golden-winged Parakeet, Guianan Toucanet, Green Aracari, Guianan Puffbird, Black Nunbird, Chestnut-rumped & Black-banded Woodcreeper, Rufous-rumped Foliage-gleaner, Black-faced Antthrush, Amazonian, Cinereous, Dusky-throated & Fasciated Antshrike, Spot-backed, Ferruginous-backed & Black-headed Antbird, Ash-winged, Long-winged, Brown-bellied, Rufous-bellied & microstictus Dot-winged Antwren, Guianan Antwarbler and phaeopygus White-necked Thrush, along with Guianan Red Howler Monkey, Guianan Brown Capuchin, Golden-handed Tamarin, Neotropical Pygmy Squirrel & Red-rumped Agouti. After dusk, before dinner, a nocturnal foray along the access road delivered great views of Common Potoo, Crested Owl & Tawny-bellied Screech-Owl, Short-tailed Nighthawk and the ever-present Pauraque; while Black-banded Owl and Slaty-backed Forest-Falcon were heard only. Stayed at Zintete-Fredberg Lodge.

Mon Dec 4

Zintete-Fredberg Lodge

Another day at this most fantastic birding spot, that we had all to ourselves again today. Highlights included **Guianan Cock-of-the-rock**, Amazonian Pygmy-Owl, Golden-collared Woodpecker, **Painted Parakeet**, **Lilac-tailed & Sapphire-rumped Parrotlet**, Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, **Black-spotted Barbet**, Paradise, Brown & **Yellow-billed Jacamar**, Slender-billed Xenops, **McConnell's Spinetail**, Rufous-capped Antthrush, **Spot-tailed Antwren**, **Todd's Sirystes**, Cocoa Thrush, Opal-rumped, Paradise, **Blue-backed**, **Spotted**, **Speckled**, **Yellow-backed & Red-billed Pied Tanager**, **Golden-sided & Finsch's Euphonia**. After dusk, before dinner, we had another go at the access road and this time had **great views of Black-banded Owl**; Crested Owl and Slaty-backed Forest-Falcon were heard only. After dinner we had **great views of** a **Spectacled Owl** that was calling above our cabin at Zintete Lodge. Stayed at Zintete Lodge.

Tue Dec 5

Zintete-Fredberg Lodge to Fredberg

Today three of us (Garry, Gerjon and I) basically took all day for the ascent to the top of Fredberg (Chris stayed behind at Zintete Lodge). Two targets for the day, that we both dipped, were Bandtailed Antshrike and Southern Wing-banded Antbird. In chronological order, today's highlights included Marail Guan, Great Jacamar, lekking males Guianan Cock-of-the-rock (at the bottom of the Fredberg trail), McConnell's Flycatcher, Goldenscale Anole (lizard), Reddish Hermit, HO Crimson Fruitcrow, Rose-breasted Chat, Boat-billed Tody-tyrant, luteifrons Tawny-crowned Greenlet, Black-bellied Cuckoo, Whiskered Flycatcher and Common Scale-backed Antbird. The latter four were seen in a major all-storey mixed flock counting more than 50 birds, of which we were able to identify less than half. Arrived at the top at 4 pm; starting 4.15 we had some light rain. Stayed on top of Fredberg in a hammock and a slight chill.

Wed Dec 6

Fredberg to Zintete-Fredberg Lodge

Spent between 6.45 and 9 am at the **Guianan Cock-of-the-rock** lek (8m, 2f) on top of Fredberg, where we also ran into a singing male **Rose-breasted Chat** and **two Little Chachalacas**; Guianan Schiffornis & Variegated Antpitta were HO unfortunately. At 10 am, scanning the rainforest for Harpy and cotingas, we spotted a distant **Orange-breasted Falcon** in the top of a tree, in direct comparison with a pair of more or less nearby Bat Falcons. Departing the top at 10.30 am, we slowly walked back, finding more or less the same birds as the day before, until at 1 pm we stumbled upon a feeding pair of **Southern Wing-banded Antbirds**. Brilliant views were obtained as they were totally oblivious to our presence: we could just follow them while they vigorously tossed leaves aside in a buttonquail fashion. We arrived at Fred's parked van at 3 pm and drove slowly back towards Zintete Lodge, when Fred suddenly stopped: he'd spotted an adult and an immature male **Crimson Fruitcrow** in the canopy! Needless to say we spent some time with these beauties before carrying on. While we still saw a couple of good birds in the afternoon, the highlight surely consisted of two male **Crimson Topaz** catching gnats from a bunch of twigs at the opposite side of the small river at Zintete-Fredberg Lodge – scope views to be enjoyed with beer or cup of tea in hand. Stayed at Zintete-Fredberg Lodge.

Thu Dec 7 Cotinga bonanza

Zintete-Fredberg Lodge

First lifer of the day was a pair of Rufous-throated Antbirds Chris had bumped into the previous day at a small army antswarm along the Zintete access track; a trip-exclusive **Ruddy Spinetail** was feeding nearby. Another fruitless check at one of Fred's Band-tailed Antshrike sites sort of paid off in untickable views of a male Guianan Red Cotinga flying overhead. Ten (previous) red-letter-birds later (incl Caica Parrot, Guianan Toucanet, Black Nunbird & Amazonian Pygmy-Owl) we found ourselves a **large army antswarm**, with no less than **10 Rufous-throated**, **8 albifrons White-plumed & 2m Black-headed Antbirds attending**, all giving great views! The day would however soon convert from good to excellent, when we bumped into **5 lekking Capuchinbirds** (instant bird-of-the-trip), 2 Spangled, 2 Pompadour, **a pair of Guianan Red and a confiding male Purple-breasted Cotinga**. This could only mean one thing – next, Fred found us a **pair of Dusky Purpletuft** preening in the canopy, even at Zintete a species that is not easy to find.

Fri Dec 8

Zintete-Fredberg Lodge to Brownsberg

Our second attempt at **Zigzag Heron** paid off: at 6.30 am we were watching one in the small creek 50m behind the lodge, fabulous views! Other trip-exclusives that suddenly decided to play ball included **White-chested Puffbird**, Pectoral Sparrow & Short-tailed Pygmy-tyrant. **Three lekking Capuchinbirds right behind the lodge** surely was another bonus encounter, followed by a pair of Great Jacamar. We departed for Brownsberg after lunch (1.15 pm), did some shopping along the way and arrived at the top of <u>Brownsberg</u> at 4 pm. A walk over the premises of the settlement yielded a flock of **15 Lilac-tailed Parrotlets** giving prolonged scope views, while the resident flock of **Grey-winged Trumpeter** nearly sat on our laps. Four **White-throated Manakins**, *nigriceps* **Golden-olive Woodpecker**, **Blackish Nightjar** at a daytime roost and a **Marail Guan** perched in a *Cecropia* in front of our lodge completed the set of today's highlights. Stayed at Tapir Lodge, Brownsberg.

Sat Dec 9 Brownsberg

Before 7 am we were already watching a **feeding Sharpbill** in the *Clusia grandiflora* **in front of our lodge**, accompanied by scores of other fruit-eating birds like White-throated Manakin & *nigriceps* Golden-olive Woodpecker. Best birds of our morning walk over the top of Brownsberg were Spot-tailed, Rufous-bellied & **Pygmy Antwren**, Golden-headed & **White-fronted Manakin**, **Black-throated Antshrike**, Slaty-capped Shrike-Vireo, Fulvous Shrike-Tanager, **Musician Wren**, **Amazonian (Rothschild's) Grosbeak**, as well as **mushroom-of-the-trip Favolus brasiliensis**. Star bird of the afternoon walk was undoubtedly **Collared Puffbird**, that we had brilliant and prolonged views of; **sev flocks of Grey-winged Trumpeter** were also entertaining. An evening walk yielded sev interesting moths, Turnip-tailed Gecko and the frogs *Callimedusa tomopterna*, *Phyllomedusa hypochondrialis* and *Pristimantis zeuctotylus*. Stayed at Tapir Lodge, Brownsberg.

Sun Dec 10 Brownsberg

A pair of **Black Curassow**, Pompadour, Spangled & 1f **Guianan Red Cotinga**, **Sharpbill**, **Tufted Coquette**, **Blue-backed Tanager**, both Ochre-bellied & McConnell's Flycatcher, **Black-throated Antshrike**, Black-throated Antbird, Buff-throated, Chestnut-rumped & **Guianan Woodcreeper**, Red-throated Caracara and a trip-exclusive Short-tailed Hawk were today's avian highlights. Mammals Red-rumped Agouti & Common Red Brocket (Deer), Common Monkey Lizard (Anole) *Polychrus marmoratus* & Giant Ameiva *Ameiva ameiva*, moths *Trosia nigropunctigera*, *Automerina auletes* & *Calonotos longipennis* and praying mantis *Angela guianensis* were also nice. Stayed at Tapir Lodge, Brownsberg.

Mon Dec 11

Brownsberg to Paramaribo

A last check of all lights in the Brownsberg settlement yielded the fantastic moths Arsenura ponderosa quianensis. Xvlophanes media. Adhemarius gannascus. Hvlesia teratex. Hvalurga mysis & Podalia orsilochus. The plan to stop-and-bird our way down Brownsberg worked out great, starting with great views of sev feeding Guianan Toucanets. At one point, playing the sound of Amazonian Pygmy-Owl created a flock containing goodies like Opal-rumped & Spotted Tanager, Golden-sided Euphonia, Sharpbill, McConnell's Flycatcher & Great Jacamar; the star bird in it however was a White-throated Pewee, so very localised and seldom-seen that it was a lifer not only to us, but also to Fred, Otte (who tried for it weeks later) and sev other visiting birders since. The next stops yielded Green Aracari, Collared Trogon, Red-billed Pied Tanager, Pompadour Cotinga, Spot-tailed Antwren, White-throated Manakin, with next highlight a cooperative pair of Guianan Red Cotinga; finally, the male showed well for all! After lunch in Zanderij we paid a final visit to the white sand forest adjacent to the airport, where we connected with **Red-shouldered** Tanager, Brown-throated Parakeet and, after a heavy downpour (that Fred and I were in, fruitlessly searching for Giant Snipe), a pair of Ash-throated Crake. We arrived at Eco Resort Inn. Paramaribo, at 4.30 pm, where we birded the gardens until dusk and found Ashy-headed Greenlet, Sick's Swift, Bicolored Conebill, Green-throated Mango, Yellow-chinned Spinetail, massive roost migration of Little Blue & Tricolored Heron & HO Rufous-sided Crake. Stayed at Eco Resort Inn.

Tue Dec 12 Paramaribo to Amsterdam

After a lavish breakfast at Eco Resort Inn, we birded our way through the Torarica Hotel gardens, with best bird being a feeding first-summer Scarlet Ibis at the mudflats bordering the river. Having heard about the heronry at the pumping station holding Boat-billed Herons, we entered through a fence, heading for someone to ask permission to enter – but were apprehended by security forces within a minute: it turned out the pumping station grounds are bordered by secret police offices. Our passports were copied and we were reprimanded for entering without permission. However, within 20 mins we were on our way again, walking into town for some sightseeing: among others, Paramaribo is known for its beautiful old wooden quarters, a square that holds a synagogue, a mosque and a church, and the largest wooden church in the world. We also checked the Vaco bookstore for local fieldguides, finding a nice book on Suriname snakes. Back at Eco Resort Inn we had lunch and bided our time until at 5 pm our bus to the airport departed. Departed the airport at 9.40 pm. Arrived in Amsterdam on Wed Dec 13, 10.30 am.

VISITED SITES (in chronological order) & most important sightings NOTE that Suriname has plenty even more remote Amazonian birding options, such as Palumeu, Kabalebo and Raleigh Falls (see Van der Spek 2011, p. 15); however, these sites require a flight and are generally more expensive, so for this introductory trip we limited ourselves to sites within c 3 hrs drive from the international airport – and had a truly great time.

Peperpot (GPS 5.775, -55.133), Nov 27 and (GPS 5.801, -55.119), Nov 30 This out-of-use old Dutch cocoa plantation has a rich avifauna and is especially good for some of the coastal specialties not (as easily) found at the rainforest sites further inland: Zintete Lodge and Brownsberg. These coastal specialties are the range-restricted Arrowhead Piculet, Blood-colored Woodpecker, Crimson-hooded Manakin, Little Hermit and Painted Tody-flycatcher, along with Amazonian Royal Flycatcher, Cinnamon Attila and Slender-billed Kite. A trail starts at the eastern side and ends, after c 4 km, at the western side, at the Suriname river. NOTE however that the gate at the western side is closed after c 2.30 pm, so one cannot exit and has to walk back. Getting back to one's car, if parked at the eastern end, by road is difficult, as there is very little traffic and no public transport at the western end.

The trail starting behind the visitor's center at the eastern end can always be accessed, even before opening hours (8 am to 5 pm); one is required to pay a small entrance fee even if one enters outside office hours.

The Bradt Guide and the Field Guide to the Birds of Suriname mention that the trail is closed on Mondays (which incidentally was also our first full day in Suriname) but this is no longer the case. However, we didn't know and so on our first day started birding the scrub along the road near the western end of the trail, which was quite productive.

Best records Peperpot W end (GPS 5.7751, -55.1332 and further northwest along Weg naar Peperpot), Nov 27 (6.20–11.15 am): Arrowhead Piculet, Blood-colored Woodpecker, Lesson's Seedeater, Campina (Black-billed ssp arthuri) Thrush, Silvered Antbird, displaying Donacobius, Yellow Oriole, Cinnamon Attila, Spotted Tody-flycatcher, Black-crested Antshrike, Ashy-headed Greenlet, Short-tailed & Chapman's Swift, Green-throated Mango, Glittering-throated Emerald, Greyish Mourner, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Fork-tailed Flycatcher, Plain-crowned Spinetail, Turquoise & White-shouldered Tanager, Slender-billed Kite, White-vented Euphonia & Greyish (Caribbean Grey) Saltator. By chance, I photographed the third Carmelita Pondhawk for the Guyanas in a ditch, amongst the more common Pin-tailed & Black Pondhawks. Rainbow Whiptail was common. Three **Phallus indusiatus** were a pleasant surprise.

Best records Peperpot E end, main entrance (GPS 5.7998, -55.1185), Nov 30 (7 am - 5.20 pm): Arrowhead Piculet, Blood-colored Woodpecker, Crimson-hooded Manakin, Little Hermit, Painted Tody-flycatcher, Campina (Black-billed ssp arthuri) & Spectacled Thrush, Guianan & Olive-green Tyrannulet, Ochre-lored & Grey-crowned Flatbill, Spotted Puffbird, Green-tailed Jacamar, Chestnut Woodpecker, Great Potoo (chanced upon), Limpkin, Aplomado Falcon (over the car park at dawn on Nov 27), Slender-billed Kite, Cinnamon Attila, Guianan Trogon, White-winged Becard, Little Cuckoo, Lesser Swallow-tailed & Short-tailed Swift, Blue-chinned Sapphire, Green-throated & Black-throated Mango, Black-chinned, White-browed & Blackish Antbird, Buff-breasted Wren, Yellow-throated Flycatcher, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Grey-necked Wood-rail. Amazonian Royal Flycatcher breeds, but we dipped. Cinereous Tinamou was HO. Red-rumped Agouti, Common Squirrel Monkey and Guianan Capuchin Monkeys were the mammals seen.

Chocopot (GPS 5.861, -55.207), Nov 27 (3-4.10 pm)

Known as a good site for Crimson-hooded Manakin & Cocoa Thrush, we found this old overgrown Dutch cocoa plantation rather quiet and full of mosquitoes in late afternoon. Best records were **Crimson-hooded Manakin, Hooded Tanager**, Little Cuckoo, Campina (Black-billed ssp *arthuri*) Thrush, White-winged Becard, Greenish Elaenia, Buff-breasted Wren, Buff-throated Woodcreeper and a pair of Purple Martin. Cocoa Thrush was HO.

Pale-throated Three-toed Sloth and Long-winged Harrier were seen btw Chocopot and Weg naar Zee, Striped Cuckoo was HO.

Weg naar Zee (GPS 5.901, -55.226), Nov 27 (5-5.45 pm)

This road ultimates at a hindu temple on Surinames north coast but overlooks vast mudflats (at least at low tide) to the east before reaching the temple. We chanced upon a rather distant flock of **19 feeding Scarlet Ibis**, with 1 Roseate Spoonbill (interesting mix of colour). An even more distant **Rufous Crab Hawk** meant we saw two of our main coastal targets, but views left much to be desired, especially in the case of the hawk. Other birds here included tons of Semipalmated Sandpipers & Little Blue Herons, with dozens of Semipalmated Plovers and Greater Yellowlegs and single Barn Swallow, Cabot's Tern and Lesser Yellow-headed Vultures flying past. Dozens of fiddler crabs were thought to be *Uca maracoani*.

Powakka (GPS 5.424, -55.071 and 5.343, -55.093), Nov 28 (6.40 am-12.45 pm)

This is the name of a village east of Zanderij. It is surrounded by white-sand forest and is one of the best localities in the world for the localized Pale-bellied Mourner, a bird that sings rarely and does not respond to tape. After many hours of trying (picking up other specialties of the region/habitat) we heard one, but never saw it. Since white-sand is a poor-nutrition soil, birds and plants are few and far between but the ones there are usually specialties. With Otte we visited two different spots: the first with relatively low bushes with occasional higher stands of forest (optimal for the Mourner), with no trails and easy to get lost in; and a denser, higher type of forest ideal for Saffron-crested Tyrant-Manakin. At the first spot we saw Southern White-fringed Antwren, Bronzy Jacamar, Yellow-bellied, Plain-crested & Rufous-crowned Elaenia, Bran-colored Flycatcher, Red-billed (White-throated) & Channel-billed Toucan, Green-tailed Goldenthroat, Scaled Pigeon, Yellow-green Grosbeak and Pompadour Cotinga, and heard Little Chachalaca; at the second we saw Saffron-crested Tyrant-Manakin, Northern ('Guianan') Slaty-Antshrike, Spotted Puffbird, Black Manakin (at lek), Lineated Woodpecker & White-bearded Manakin (at lek) and heard Pale-bellied Mourner, Bronzy Jacamar, Thrush-like Antpitta & Little Tinamou; in the open area between the two we saw Burnished-buff & Black-faced Tanager.

Zanderij (GPS 5.456, -55.206), Nov 28 and Dec 1

The main town near the international airport and therefore a (small) hub in the country. Adjacent to the airport, some patches of 'savanna' and white-sand forest hold specialties like **Red-shouldered Tanager** (and probably Pale-bellied Mourner as well). The airport holds the only breeding pairs of Burrowing Owl in the country, and the open terrain within and just outside the

fence is apparently also good for Crested Bobwhite (we didn't see any on two visits), Red-breasted Blackbird, Ruddy-breasted Seedeater, Grassland Sparrow, Eastern Meadowlark and perhaps also Giant Snipe. While looking for the latter in heavy rain, Fred and I stumbled upon a pair of **Ash-throated Crake** and Brown-throated Parakeet. We also had great views here of Lesser Nighthawks hunting termites in the rain. Driving NW and then N from Zanderij towards Republiek one passes forested recreational areas Colakreek and Vier Kinderen, where good rainforest is found.

Colakreek (GPS 5.477, -55.228), Nov 28 (3.35-4.35 pm) and Dec 1 (9-10 am)
This cola-coloured creek just NW of Zanderij & the airport is a very popular spot with Suriname people at weekends, and is best avoided by birders then. However, it is a very good primary rainforest spot and holds scores of specialties and numbers of birds. We visited twice, once with Otte & once with Fred, at suboptimal times (late afternoon and mid morning resp.) but still saw some good birds. This is the site where most Suriname sightings of White Bellbird come from, and one of the very few sites for the localized Smoky-fronted Tody-flycatcher (we dipped twice). We saw Palmcreeper, Glossy-backed Becard (singing male), Northern Red-shouldered & Red-bellied Macaw, Dusky-chested Flycatcher, Green-rumped Parrotlet & Turquoise Tanager, and heard Russet-crowned Crake & White-throated Toucan with Otte; and with Fred, near Republiek, added Cayenne Jay, Golden-sided Euphonia, Pompadour Cotinga, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Coraya Wren, Giant Cowbird, Green-backed Trogon & White-bearded Manakin.

Warappa Kreek (GPS 5.957, -54.917), Nov 29

This is the best site in Suriname for Rufous Crab-Hawk and Scarlet Ibis. The mangrove creek departs the eastern tributary of the Suriname river and exits in the Atlantic c 15 km further north. The thick mangrove forest harbours some local specialties, such as **Rufous Crab-Hawk** (we saw 19), **Blood-colored, Crimson-crested, Cream-colored & Spot-breasted Woodpecker** (the latter three trip-exclusives), **Crimson-hooded Manakin** & **Pale-tipped Inezia**; American Pygmy Kingfishers were common and we saw several Black-crested Antshrikes. Departing from the northeast part of Paramaribo prior to dawn, we first crossed to the eastern side of the Suriname river and briefly stopped at a major heron roost, before moving up eastwards into the tributary, where **100+ Orange-winged Amazons** (pairs and small flocks) flew overhead along with herons, kingfishers and swallows. Like most mangroves worldwide, the many mosquitoes were a nuisance and birds were few and far apart. At 1 pm we reached the lagoon just south of the beach, where we saw a flock of **9 Scarlet Ibis** roosting in mangrove trees, as well as dozens of Yellow-crowned Night Herons.

Bakkie (GPS 5.914, -54.895), Nov 29

This is a quiet lodge and restaurant at the entrance of Warappa Kreek, surrounded by lush second-growth that attracts many passerines & hummingbirds. At the time of our visit, Bakkie could only be reached by boat, but there are plans to create a 20-km cycling path connecting it with Paramaribo. At both ends of our Warappa Kreek boatride we stopped at Bakkie for a refreshment and to use the bathroom – and found that the flowering shrubs and trees attracted smaller hummingbirds, most noticeably Glittering-throated and **Plain-bellied Emerald**. Other birds seen here include a pair of Donacobius, Spotted Tody-flycatcher, Great & Barred Antshrike.



In the field thought to be the, in Suriname, rarely seen White-chested Emerald *Amazilia brevirostris*, we later identified this bird as Plain-bellied Emerald *A. l. leucogaster*, Bakkie, 29 Nov 2017 (Gerjon Gelling)

Zintete-Fredberg Lodge (GPS 4.635, -55.420), Dec 1-8

Nowadays the number one site in Suriname (that is reachable by car) with an ever-growing list of specialties, most of which can be seen in about a week. The birdlist now stands at 316 species; lists are also available for mammals, reptiles & dragonflies. The lodge is reached by car about four hrs south of Paramaribo (three from the airport at Zanderij). See Lodging (p. 9) for more details on how to get there and what the layout is like. Specialties recorded in our week incl 10 Crimson Fruitcrow, 1p Dusky Purpletuft, dozens of Pompadour & Spangled, 3 each of Purple-breasted & Guianan Red Cotinga, Guianan Cock-of-the-rock (at two leks), Capuchinbird (lekking), 1p (Southern) Wing-banded Antbird, Marail Guan, Little Chachalaca, Grey-winged Trumpeter, Zigzag Heron, Spectacled, Black-banded & Crested Owl, Amazonian Pygmy-Owl, Crimson Topaz, Tufted Coquette, Orange-breasted Falcon, 'Guianan Trogon', Black-spotted Barbet, Waved & Golden-collared Woodpecker, Dusky & Caica Parrot, Painted Parakeet, Lilac-tailed Parrotlet, Black Nunbird, Guianan Puffbird, Guianan Toucanet, Green Aracari, Great, Paradise & Yellow-billed Jacamar, McConnell's Spinetail, Chestnut-rumped & Guianan (Lineated) Woodcreeper, Spotted Antpitta, Ash-winged, Todd's, Spot-tailed, Rufous-bellied, Brown-bellied & Guianan Streaked Antwren, Guianan Antwarbler, 'Guianan' (Northern) Slaty- & Black-throated Antshrike,

Black-chinned, Black-headed, *albifrons* White-plumed, Rufous-throated & Ferruginous-backed Antbird, Glossy-backed Becard, Guianan Schiffornis, Rose-breasted Chat, Red-billed Pied, Yellow-backed & Blue-backed Tanager, Finsch's Euphonia, Boat-billed Tody-tyrant, Todd's Sirystes, Guianan Tyrannulet and McConnell's Flycatcher. Specialties we dipped were Harpy, Red-billed Woodcreeper & Band-tailed Antshrike.

In the annotated checklist I call the greater Zintete Lodge area (incl the lodge's surroundings, the access road and the logging road) simply 'Zintete'; actual sites are found at Observation.org but the sites (as well as the birds) cannot be reached and/or found if not accompanied by Fred.

Fredberg (GPS 4.644, -55.495), Dec 5-6

This is a rock at c 275m asl, towering above the rainforest, located c 12 km from Zintete Lodge, of which 8 km can be driven and 4 km needs to be walked up. It's possible to stay on top in hammocks and the view is fantastic, giving chances of seeing Harpy or **Orange-breasted Falcon** in early morning. Note that the views of the treetops are distant, so views won't be great. There's an **active Guianan Cock-of-the-rock lek** right on top, where we also recorded White-throated Manakin, Rose-breasted Chat and Guianan Schiffornis. Even though the climb is not that long and the views are great, birders best focus their efforts on the trail itself, where we witnessed a great show of a feeding pair of (Southern) Wing-banded Antbird at a known territory.

Brownsberg (GPS 4.949, -55.181), Dec 8-11

An easily accessible area of tropical rainforest c 2 hrs' drive south of Paramaribo found at a maximum of 515m above sealevel. The settlement on top and some of the trails (and waterfalls) apparently attract a lot of visitors in holidays and weekends, meaning wildlife is used to people. Especially Red-rumped Agouti and flocks of Grey-winged Trumpeter roam around the premises and can be approached to 10m or less; it is said that in the rainy season an Ornate Hawk-Eagle hunts lizards around the settlement (but it wasn't there when we were). Best birds recorded by us along the trails on top and around the settlement were Collared Puffbird, Sharpbill, Black Curassow, Guianan Red Cotinga, Grey-winged Trumpeter, Golden-headed, White-fronted & Whitethroated Manakin, Red-billed Pied & Blue-backed Tanager, Ferruginous-backed & Blackthroated Antbird, Pygmy, Rufous-bellied, Brown-bellied & Spot-tailed Antwren, Guianan Antwarbler, Racket-tailed & Tufted Coquette, Black-spotted Barbet, Musician Wren, Lilac-tailed Parrotlet, Guianan Schiffornis, Guianan Toucanet, King Vulture, Slender-billed Xenops, Lined Forest-Falcon, Yellow-throated, Red-necked, nigriceps Golden-olive & Waved Woodpecker, Marail Guan, Green Aracari, Blackish Nightjar, Thrush-like Antpitta, Black-throated Antshrike, Amazonian (Rothschild's) Grosbeak, Fulvous Shrike-Tanager, phaeopygus White-necked Thrush, Cinereous Mourner, Greenbacked, Black-tailed & Collared Trogon, Pompadour & Spangled Cotinga, Dusky & Red-fan Parrot & Guianan Woodcreeper.

Birding along the road downslope delivered more and better views of Guianan Red Cotinga and, best bird recorded by us, the rare and localized **White-throated Pewee** (lifer for Fred and sev other birders that twitched the bird weeks after our discovery). Friends who visited Brownsberg mid-November saw singing White Bellbird & Red-and-black Grosbeak.

We also encountered an interesting array of mammals, amphibians, moths and other insects, such as Red-handed Tamarin, Guianan Red Howler Monkey, Guiana Spider Monkey, Bearded Saki, Black-capped Capuchin, Common Red Brocket, Red-rumped Agouti, Common Opossum; Turnip-tailed Gecko, Black Tegu, Three-striped Poison Frog, Oophagus Slender-legged Tree Frog, Anomaloglossus baeobatrachus, Polychrus marmoratus, Guianan Shield Leaf Frog and Rhinella granulosa, Pristimantis zeuctotylus, Orange-legged Leaf Frog & Tiger-striped Leaf Frog; bugs Paryphes flavocinctus, Acanthocephala nr. femorata (= granulosa) & Enchophora prasina; and moths Arsenura ponderosa guianensis, Adhemarius gannascus and Trosia nigropunctigera. Extraordinary mushrooms seen here were Favolus brasiliensis, Leucocoprinus fragillisimus, Dacryopinax spathularia and Arcyria cinerea.

Paramaribo: Eco Resort Inn & Torarica Hotel (GPS 5.8298, -55.1440), Dec 12 The gardens of these two lodges are good sites for birding within Paramaribo city limits. Specialties we recorded during the two hours we birded here include Scarlet Ibis (probably not regular), Bicolored Conebill, Rufous-sided Crake (HO), Ashy-headed Greenlet & Yellow-chinned Spinetail.

Sites not visited

Suriname has a large number of other good birding sites that we unfortunately did not have the time for (this time). Many of these sites are described on Otte Ottema's website, and include Bigipan (mangrove and marsh birds in the NW of the country), Kabalebo (a rainforest lodge only reachable by small aircraft), Raleighfalls and Palumeu (equally good rainforest locations further south in Suriname).

RECORDED DATA (Observation.org)

Sharing one's observations directly from the field using Observation.org becomes more and more commonplace, with birders now widely using smartphones and improved cell phone coverage in remoter areas of the world.

In the field, GB, GG and RH recorded most of their sightings (birds, mammals, reptiles & amphibians, dragonflies) with accurate GPS locations by using an app (ObsMapp or iObs) on their smartphones. Whenever we had Wifi we uploaded our sightings onto Observation.org, a free, easy-to-use website that

- gives accurate site, time and date details with all observations (in our case, birds, reptiles, butter- and dragonflies, mammals, mushrooms and plants);
- has both standard fields (location, date & time, number of individuals, certainty of ID) and a field for extra info should one want to add any;
- makes all locations easily available for others, using GoogleEarth maps;
- enables the observer to store photographs and/or sound recordings with one's sightings;
- generates the observer's (life, country, site, trip) lists and
- has the capability to generate multiple exports, such as by species, date-of-year, area etc.

By querying Observation.org one can see all our data. Select our trip dates (26 Nov – 12 Dec 2017) and the country (Suriname) to view all our Suriname records (including photographs). Alternatively, one could also approach just one person's records by clicking 'Users' under the tab of 'This site'. To view *all* Suriname data, click 'Geography' and 'South America by country' and then 'Suriname' on the map displayed.

Recorded birds

Taxonomy roughly follows HBW Alive*. All range-restricted species (**RR**) and odd-looking range-restricted subspecies (**RRs**) are highlighted, to indicate the most important birds recorded. Basically, all specific subspecies occurring only in the area comprised by E Venezuela, the Guianas and Brazil north of the Amazon are range-restricted, and thus deserve the status **RRs**. However, below I reserve (my) **RRs** status for those subspecies I think are indeed highly localised, and/or look or sound very different from other subspecies. This (very subjective) view is based mainly on HBW Alive depicting a particular subspecies, or describes the range as very specific. **RR(s)** = both the species and the particular subspecies are range-restricted; highlighted non-RR birds are personal favorites / rarely recorded birds.

NOTE that an incredible number of species was originally described from Suriname or the nearby Guyanas, so that most of the birds encountered there are of the nominate subspecies.

- *Not because I follow that taxonomy myself (I only count birds seen well, IOC list), but because the HBW list emphasizes structural morphological and other differences in populations, so that that particular taxonomy highlights best the importance of the Guianan shield endemic taxa.








