#### **C**rnamental Characteristics

Size:

Height: up to 100' (narrower spread) Leaves: Evergreen Shape: pyramidal - conical Ornamental Other: prefers sun

#### Environmental Characteristics

### Cultivars for Pinus strobiformis

Cultivar Name	Notes
Coronado	'Coronado' - dwarf, broad upright form; bluish green, soft needles
Foxtail	'Foxtail' - compact pyramidal habit; needles are blue-green; needles taper and shoot tips, evoking a "fox-tail" look; grows to 7' tall x 3' wide in 10 years
Glauca Compacta	'Glauca Compacta' - columnar to pyramidal form; compact grower; slow growing; grows to 6' in 10 years; bluish-green needles; tolerant of poor, acidic soils, and drought; grows to 6 - 20' in 10-15 years
Loma Linda	'Loma Linda' - broad pyramidal form; soft and silver-blue foliage; grows to 6' tall x 3' wide in 10 years
Pendula	'Pendula' - main leader and weeping side branches; narrow when young, becoming more broad at maturity; silvery blue-green foliage; grows to 12' tall x 4' wide in 10 years
