Day 1 (27.06.19): Our first day in this fascinating country, and what better place to start birding than the outskirts of the capital, Port Moresby, where just a short distance away lie both the Pacific Adventist University and Varirata National Park (Varirata NP), both well-known birding hotspots. A few group members had arrived earlier this morning, while the remainder of us followed around midday. After lunch we decided to begin with a look around the grounds of our hotel, Dixies Bungalows, before driving to the Pacific Adventist University (PAU), where we would spend the rest of the evening. Our first bird at the lodge was a New Guinea Friarbird, but as there was not much activity around the lodge we moved on quickly to the PAU, a 20-minute drive away. The ponds in the grounds of the PAU held a variety of species dominated by Pacific Black Duck, together with Wandering Whistling Duck, Australasian Swamphen, Dusky Moorhen, Little Pied and Little Black Cormorants, Nankeen (Rufous) Night Heron, a few Masked Lapwings and Comb-crested Jacana. Walking the grounds we scanned the private gardens and trees giving us an excellent introduction to the birds of Papua New Guinea, which included species such as Fawn-breasted Bowerbird, Bar-shouldered and Peaceful Doves, Orange-fronted Fruit Dove, Torresian Imperial Pigeon, Red-cheeked Parrot, Coconut Lorikeet, White-breasted Woodswallow, Black-backed Butcherbird, Australasian Figbird, Yellow-faced Myna, Fawn-breasted Bowerbird and Rufous-banded Honeyeater. The previous night's thunderstorm had disturbed the Papuan Frogmouths we were hoping to see at roost here, but nevertheless this was a productive first few hours birding in paradise.

Day 2 (28.06.19): After an early breakfast at the lodge, we drove up to Varirata NP at dawn to try to get to a known Raggiana Bird-of-paradise lek at first light. We arrived to find the park gates shut, so we birded outside the gate till our driver came back with the ranger. As we drove closer to the lek of the Raggiana Bird-of-paradise we could hear the incredible cacophony of the male birds calling, so we walked up the track and were delighted to be rewarded with exceptional views of the males as they displayed, fluffing up their plumes every time a female came around to investigate. We spent the rest of the morning around the car park and walking various trails through the mixed broadleaved and evergreen woodlands, scanning tree hollows for owlet-nightjars with no luck. An Orange-footed Scrubfowl made a quick escape as we flushed it from the trail, just giving brief glimpses to some as it flew. We had better luck with Brown-headed Paradise Kingfisher and Yellow-billed Kingfisher, as well as Rufous-bellied and Blue-winged Kookaburras, of which everyone had great views. After a delicious picnic lunch we enjoyed a relaxed early afternoon, keeping out of the midday sun and watching as birds came to feed in a fruiting tree, also catching great views of a few fly-overs which included Gurney's Eagle, Long-tailed Honey Buzzard, and Brahminy Kite, as well as Wompoo, Pink-spotted, Orange-bellied and Orange-fronted Fruit-Doves. Later in the day a walk along the park's access road proved very productive, with stunning views of some key species which included a Brown Quail which flew from the side of the road, Pygmy Eagle, Eclectus and Red-cheeked Parrots overhead, Black-capped Lory in a nest hole, Coconut Lorikeets flashing through the trees, Elfin (Mountain) Myzomela feeding in roadside trees, and a few Plain, Streak-headed and White-throated

Honeyeaters. Our final bird of the evening was a Barking Owl in the trees along the roadside not far from our hotel. Other species highlights for today were Black-billed Cuckoo-Dove, Purple-tailed Imperial-Pigeon, Glossy and Uniform Swiftlets, Azure Kingfisher, Rainbow Bee-eater, Mimic Honeyeater, Barred, Boyer's & Black-faced Cuckooshrikes, Varied Triller, Grey Whistler, Hooded Pitohui, Hooded Butcherbird, Drongo Fantail, Chestnut-bellied Fantail, Frilled Monarch, Laden Flycatcher, Torresian Crow, Black Berrypecker, Lemon-bellied Flycatcher, Red-capped Flowerpecker and Olive-backed Sunbird.

Day 3 (29.06.19): We left our hotel for an early flight to Wapenamanda in Enga Province, from where we would travel into a new area for the tour, the village of Sirunki in the highlands. Surprisingly for Papua New Guinea, where flights are unpredictable and frequently delayed due to weather conditions, our flight departed on time. As we were preparing to land in Wapenamanda the pilot suddenly announced that due to low cloud and poor visibility for landing we would be returning to Port Moresby; not a great situation. To our great fortune and unbeknown to us, the governor of Enga province was also travelling with us to oversee a gala welcome evening which had been planned to greet us as the first foreign group to visit Yaskom Resort at Sirunki. Back in Port Moresby, the governor took charge of our onward travel, chartering a private plane for our flight into the highlands for which we were incredibly grateful. This did mean a detour to Mount Hagen, a larger airport, from where we had a long and at times uncomfortable drive to Sirunki, accompanied by the governor and full police escort! When we finally arrived at the lodge at dusk we were greeted with a warm welcome, traditional dance performances from two local tribes, and an incredible fine dining experience from renowned chef Julz Henao using local produce from the province. And finally a comfortable bed after a long day, hoping for a good night's sleep before an early start tomorrow.

Day 4 (30.06.19): After a somewhat delayed breakfast we drove out to Puman Daka a new site in Sirunki. The trek involved a few steep climbs and a walk through some beautiful broadleaved rainforest at elevations of up to 2500m, stopping for lunch at a viewpoint overlooking cultivated fields in sweeping valleys, and Lake Sirunki in the distance. This couldn't have been a better spot to stop, and the lunch which was brought all the way up to us was excellent and welcome. Birding in the open area gave us some great views of Lawes's Parotia, Superb Bird-of-paradise (Greater Lophorina), Princess Stephanie's Astrapia, Yellow-browed and Belford's Melidectes, and both Common Smoky and Mountain Honeyeaters. Within the forests we occasionally encountered mixed flocks, comprising species like Canary Flyrobin, Brown Sicklebill, Sooty and Black Thicket Fantails, Black and Dimorphic Fantails, Blue-capped Ifrit, Brown-backed Whistler, Papuan Sittella, Brown-breasted Gerygone, Papuan, Yellow-billed and Orange-billed Lorikeet, and Papuan Treecreeper, while a good selection of other more common species included Pied Bush Chat, Pacific Swallow, Long-tailed Shrike, Willie Wagtail, Great Woodswallow, Brown Falcon and Brush Cuckoo. The remainder of the day we spent birding various sites and private gardens, enjoying both the birds and the spectacular scenery of this little-visited area.

Day 5 (01.07.19): Our second day in these surrounding took us to another new site, the Mount Komonge ridge, a motor able track with a great expanse of forest on both sides and short treks off road. The morning was quite productive, with bird activity good in pleasant temperatures. Once off the main road we set out walking the track with our vehicles following us. Before long we had a few Princess Stephanie's Astrapias, Brown Sicklebills and a male Black Sicklebill among a good selection of birds we'd seen the previous day, giving everyone the chance of better views. As the day got warmer, we headed back to the lodge with a short detour through the forest where we had our first views of a female King of Saxony Bird-of-paradise. We returned to the same area during the afternoon, though overall this was far quieter than the morning. Additional highlights during the day included Pygmy Eagle, Papuan Mountain Pigeon, Plum-faced Lorikeet, Large Scrubwren, Streaked Berrypecker, Black-bellied Cicadabird, Regent Whistler, Black-Thicket & Dimorphic Fantail, Black-fronted White-eye, Blue-capped Ifrit and Hooded Munia.

Day 6 (02.07.19): This was our last morning at Sirunki and as the birding had been so good we were reluctant to move on, so decided to spend a few hours of the morning birding along Mt Komonge ridge before we drove on to our next much awaited destination in the highlands, Kumul Lodge. Birding along Mt Komonge ridge gave us good repeat views of some previously-seen species as well as a few new to our list including Fan-tailed Cuckoo, Painted Tiger Parrot, Garnet Robin, and White-shouldered Fairywren, with better views of King of Saxony Bird-of-paradise and a Nankeen Kestrel along the drive to Kumul lodge. The drive to Kumul Lodge, close to Mount Hagen, was pleasant and we arrived in time for lunch and giving us enough time to enjoy birds around the feeding station before we headed out for a short walk around the grounds of the lodge. The walk was a bit rough with a few trees having fallen and the ground wet and slippery following a thunderstorm the previous evening. Some of the highlights on the feeders and around the grounds of the lodge this afternoon included Brehm's Tiger Parrot, Belford's and Sooty Melidectes, Ribbon-tailed Astrapia, Brown Sicklebill, White-winged Robin, Island Thrush, Papuan Scrubwren, Crested Satinbird, Crested Berrypecker, Black-breasted Boatbill, Rufous-naped Whistler and Blue-capped Ifrit.

Day 7 (03.07.19): After an early breakfast we headed for a known Lesser Bird-of-paradise lek in a casuarina grove at Kama village, though the poor road conditions meant we would have to change into different vehicles as we got closer to the site. The sky was overcast, and a thick fog had settled but through it we could hear the Bird-of-paradise calling. As the fog lifted, we had great views of Yellow-breasted Bowerbird, Meyer's Friarbird, Superb Bird-of-paradise, and Magnificent Bird-of-paradise. While we were distracted by other species a Lesser Bird-of-paradise flew into a close fruiting tree which gave us all exceptional views. Satisfied with our sightings we set out to try a site for Blue Bird-of-paradise at Tonga, approximately a 30min drive away. On reaching the site we could hear both Blue Bird-of-paradise and Superb Bird-of-paradise calling from the forested slopes. Making our way up we scanned the slope and eventually found two male and a female Superb Birds-of-paradise feeding in a fruiting tree, however the Blue Bird-of-paradise was nowhere to be seen. Just as we were preparing to leave our local guide located a very distant Blue Bird-of-paradise, but only a few of the group managed decent 'scope views before it dropped out of sight. Back at Kumul Lodge for lunch the bird feeding station was as busy as usual, and new birds to our list here and elsewhere in lodge grounds included Mountain Firetail and Grey Whistler. After lunch we decided to have a second try for Blue Bird-of-paradise, but with the sun shining and humidity high it was hard work and there was very little bird activity with the exception of a Buff-banded Rail that walked across the path. It wasn't until late afternoon when the sky became overcast that the Blue Bird-of-paradise began to show itself, finally giving us some excellent views. Other species seen during the evening included a Lawes's Parotia making its way feeding through the trees, and an Island Leaf Warbler. Driving back to the hotel we birded along the road achieving better views of some of the species seen earlier. Back at the lodge our plans for an evening walk were abandoned as it rained heavily for the rest of the night. Instead, we had an early night after a good dinner and checklist around the fire.

Day 8 (04.07.19): Another early morning start and this time we decided to try a different area and also try for some torrent species. As we drove out of the lodge it wasn't long before we stopped to check a few rivers in search for the torrent species but with no luck we drove on, instead encountering three Torrent Flyrobins by chance on a school roof. We continued our drive to the Mumbisanda Hospital, and around the gardens found a selection of birds that included a flock of Singing Starlings on the power cables. Further on, we stopped for various raptors in flight which included Brown Goshawk and a Brown Falcon. A quick stop along the Lai River did not prove productive for any torrent birds but in surrounding bushes we had good views of Black-headed Whistler, Mottle-breasted Honeyeater and Brown-breasted Gerygone. Stopping again along the roadside we birded a small patch of grassland and after a long wait were rewarded with a great sighting of the elusive Papuan Grassbird. Lunch time was spent back at the lodge watching Crested and Tit Berrypeckers around the garden, and Ribbon-tailed Astrapia, Mountain Mouse-warbler, Loria's Satinbird, Fan-tailed Berrypecker, and other species around the busy birdtable. After lunch we headed to a site for King of Saxony Bird-of-paradise, a private garden where we were made welcome by the owners. In a clearing we had a great few hours' birding from a single spot, where birds came through feeding in waves. Some of the highlights of the evening included Fan tailed and Brush Cuckoos, Princess Stephanie's Astrapia, King of Saxony Bird-of-paradise, Superb Bird-of-paradise, Canary Flyrobin, Red-capped Flowerpecker, Rufous-throated Bronze Cuckoo, Modest Tiger Parrot and Black Cicadabird among a selection of other more common species. Back at Kumul Lodge we did manage a night walk around the grounds, but it was relatively quiet although we did hear New Guinea Woodcock, Papuan Boobook and Mountain Owletnightjar.

Day 9 (05.07.19): After a few productive days in the highlands of Enga Province it was time to move on to bird the Western Province, our last area where we could expect to pick up a selection of birds new to our list. An early start took us back to Mount Hagen airport for our flight to Tabubil in the Star Mountains, where we would be spending our first few nights in the area. Birding around the airfields in Papua New Guinea is always productive, and at Mount Hagen we added Australian Pipit while waiting in the lounge and Australian Pratincole just as we were taking off. Taking off on time again meant that we should

have been on course for a good evening birding session around Tabubil, but we were again disrupted by fog and instead of landing in Tabubil we touched down in the lowlands at Kiunga, not much of a problem but necessitating another long drive. As we descended, we could see that much of this low-lying area was flooded having had heavy rain over the past few weeks. It rained throughout our drive to Tabubil but held off enough for us to bird along the way and add Blyth's Hornbill, Pasquet's Parrot, Mountain Peltops and Crinkle-collared Manucode to our list. With time to spare we decided to take a short detour to Ok Menga and were fortunate to quickly locate a Salvadori's Teal along the water's edge. At our lodge in Tabubil we were welcomed by a resident Sacred Kingfisher.

Day 10 (06.07.19): We spent this morning at Dablin Creek, birding the main track and scanning the dense forest along its length on either side. Usually this is a very fruitful site, but with thick fog hanging over the valley we saw very little. Hoping for it to lift we persevered throughout the morning, finding White-shouldered Fairywren, Long-billed Honeyeater, Carola's Parotia, Rusty Mouse-warbler and New Guinea White-eye, but eventually cut our losses to return to our lodge for lunch and to try another area in the afternoon. After an early lunch we set out to bird the area around the Ok Menga hydroelectric power facility, and various sites higher up along the river in search of various torrent species. The surrounding forests were alive with bird activity despite the high humidity and intense sun; even though a lot of the birds we encountered were species we had seen previously it was reassuring to have a good birding session after the slow morning. Species seen along the first part of the track included Long-tailed Honey-buzzard, White-eared Bronze-Cuckoo, Red-breasted Pygmy-Parrot, Streak-headed Honeyeater, Golden Cuckooshrike, Southern Variable Pitohui, Spangled Drongo and Obscure Berrypecker. Further on, we covered various tracks and at one point had great views of a few Greater Birds-of-paradise displaying in a tree along the roadside. We spent time at a viewpoint overlooking a densely forested valley, finding species including Yellow-faced Myna, Magnificent Bird-of-paradise, Boyer's Cuckooshrike, Mountain Peltops, Helmeted Friarbird, Tawny-breasted Honeyeater, Pesquet's and Eclectus Parrots, Papuan Mountain-Pigeon and Beautiful Fruit-Dove, with a striking Goshawk that swept past into a nearby treetop giving us great views. At dusk, before returning to Tabubil for the night we tried for the Shovel-billed Kookaburra, which settled briefly giving us close though not prolonged views, after which we decided to head back to the hotel for the night.

Day 11 (07.07.19): Another early start took us back to Dablin Creek hoping for a better morning than on the previous day. On reaching there it was immediately clear that the weather was a lot better, with only sporadic light showers, and with good bird activity that soon found us rushing from point to point and scanning further trees for good scope views of a number of species. By afternoon we had managed a respectable list of species with a lot of specialities which included Amboyna Cuckoo-Dove, a flock of Blue-collared Parrots in flight, Orange-breasted Fig-Parrot, Sclater's Whistler, Black Butcherbird, Black Fantail, Crinkle-collared Manucode, Carola's Parotia, Magnificent Bird-of-Paradise and Green-backed Honeyeater for some. Back at our hotel for lunch we added great views of Papuan Hanging Parrot in the hotel grounds. Early afternoon we headed back to the Ok Menga area hoping for another nice evening session of birding, however the weather didn't hold out for us and we birded through showers, though we did add a couple of new birds including Wallace's Fairywren, Papuan Black Myzomela and Black-shouldered Cicadabird.

Day 12 (08.07.19): Having planned another return to the Ok Menga area we left early from the hotel to bird the track before we got to the river, where we had better views of Brown Oriole and Rufous-backed Fantail, both of which we'd seen briefly earlier. As we were out early we were hopeful of a few of the more elusive torrent species along the river, so we got out of our vehicle well before the bridge and approached the river quietly on foot, a good tactic that was rewarded with great views of 2 Torrent Larks, a lone Torrent Flycatcher and 2 Salvadori's Teals, a great start to the morning. Continuing on, we walked the track, scanning the treetops. The weather was pleasant this morning, and we came across a good variety of species including a few new to our list. Species seen this morning included Moustached Treeswift, Long-tailed Honey Buzzard, Doria's Goshawk, Rufous-bellied Kookaburra, Eclectus Parrot, Orange-breasted Fig-Parrot, Black-capped Lory, Wallace's Fairywren, Greenbacked Gerygone, Varied Triller, Yellow-bellied and Pygmy Longbills, and Mottled Beryhunter, while a Pheasant Pigeon calling not far off the track was unfortunately disturbed by a passing local family. Having enjoyed such a productive morning here, we headed back to the same area after lunch. Starting our walk at a different point we found ourselves overlooking a valley and scanning a few fruiting trees where the highlights were a flock of Papuan Mountain-Pigeons, Crinkle-collared Manucode, Magnificent Riflebird and Greater Bird-of-Paradise. Moving on, we stopped at various viewpoints finding Superb Fruit-Dove, Eclectus Parrot and with flyovers of Pesquet's Parrot; we even had White-crowned Koel fly into a tree in front of us along the track. At the end of the track we were pleased to find Boyer's and Golden Cuckooshrikes, and Stout-billed Cuckooshrike. At dusk we headed to a spot to try for Shovel-billed Kookaburra which flew in briefly on cue, while a Marbled Frogmouth was heard but not seen. A productive final day in Tabubil, which had provided us with a great start to birding in PNG's Western Province.

Day 13 (09.07.19): Having planned an early start we were all packed and ready to leave only to realise that our vehicle had not arrived, delaying our start. Once on the road we stopped occasionally before reaching Km-17 for our short trek into the forest. With the weather hot and humid the forest was quiet, but we were here to look for King Bird-of-Paradise, which we could hear in a distance. As we got closer, we could hear it call, and although locating it at the top of its tree took some time it eventually showed well. All pleased with such good views of this superb bird we headed to our hotel in the town of Kiunga for lunch. The rest of the evening we spent on a visit to Boyestown Road, scanning the area from Bower hill. The weather was overcast with light showers, and although this made birding somewhat slower we did find Black-billed and Amboyna Cuckoo-Doves, Pink-spotted and Orange-bellied Fruit-Doves, Pinon's Imperial-Pigeon, Red-cheeked Parrot, Red-flanked Lorikeet, Black-caped Lory, Mimic Honeyeater, Papuan Babbler, Boyer's and Golden Cuckooshrikes, Lowland Peltops, Glossy-mantled Manucode and Greater Bird-of-paradise.

Day 14 (10.07.19): Today we were taking a boat up the Fly River and its tributary the Elevala River to get to Kwatu Lodge for an overnight stay. Another early start from our hotel got to the boat at dawn. As we slowly made our way along the first few miles along the Fly river it was fascinating to watch locals fishing from their small dugouts, and to see how much the river is used as a mode of transport for travelling into the city for daily chores. The bird activity started to pick up as it got brighter and soon we were stopping to look at Collared Imperial-Pigeon, Zoe's Imperial-Pigeon, Papuan Spine-tailed Swift, Intermediate Egret, Brahminy Kite, White-bellied Sea-Eagle, Dollarbird, Palm Cockatoo, Double-eyed Fig-Parrot, Black-caped Lory, Trumpet and Glossy-mantled Manucode, Shining Flycatcher, Metallic Starling and Golden Myna. As we reached the Elevala River the river became a lot narrower, with less with human activity, and we made a stop at a small fishing village to pick up our cook for the night. He had located a Flame Bowerbird's bower, so we were soon out of the boat for a trek into the forest to sit in a newly built hide overlooking the bower, but sadly there was no activity and we continued on to Kwatu for lunch. Some highlights along the river before lunch included Orange-bellied Fruit-Dove, Lesser Black Coucal, Pacific Koel, Grey-headed Goshawk, Blyth's Hornbill, Sulphur-crested Cockatoo, Yellow-streaked Lory and Black Sunbird. After lunch we were back in the boat to travel to a patch of swamp forest, where we would try for some of the area's specialities on foot. With heavy rainfall over the past few weeks the swamp had been flooded, and although water levels had dropped it was still muddy and slippery, making walking hard going in places. We managed a short walk, finding Purple-tailed Imperial-Pigeon, White-bellied Pitohui, Spotwinged Monarch and Frilled Monarch among others. Spending the evening on the river till dusk we enjoyed the peace and tranquillity of the surroundings, together with great views of the incongruous Scheepmaker's Crowned-Pigeon as well as Papuan Nightjar, Twelve-wired Bird-of-paradise and Grey Crow. Back to the lodge for dinner and checklist by candlelight.

Day 15 (11.07.19): Woken early by the dawn chorus, we were back into the boat after a quick breakfast in search of our first target for the day, Twelve-wired Bird-of-paradise. Sitting in the stationary boat we watched the bare branches that broke the skyline waiting for the male we could hear calling to return to its perch. Before too long it did, and began its fascinating display twirling around, up and down the top of its chosen pole. Later that morning we walked a different area of the Swamp forest, but the density here made birding difficult and we failed to find the Papuan Pitta that was calling. Frustrated, we walked on to a hide overlooking a feeding site of Flightless Rail, but with water levels still high the bird was calling nearby but avoiding the feeding site, though it did make a very brief appearance and was seen by a few in the group. After a long wait at the hide we made our way back to the boat, finding both Little and Common Paradise-Kingfishers within a short span before heading back to the lodge for lunch. After lunch we spent some time at another Flame Bowerbird hide very close to the lodge, again located

by the resident cook! With no luck we reluctantly packed up and loaded the boat to make our way back to the comfort of our hotel in Kiunga. The boat ride back was pleasant, stopping occasionally to pick up on birds flying past or in riverside trees. Some of the highlights of our journey back included Dwarf fruit-Dove, Pinon's Imperial-Pigeon, Pacific Baza, Azure Kingfisher, Papuan King-Parrot, Large Fig-Parrot, Helmeted Friarbird, Glossy-mantled Manucode, Grey Crow, Metallic Starling, and a male Flame Bowerbird that flew across the boat.

Day 16 (12.07.19): Back in Kiunga and after an early breakfast we returned to Boyestown Road. We encountered many species we'd seen earlier, with better views well appreciated, and were lucky with a stunning male Flame Bowerbird that flew back and forth across the road. We did come across a group of local boys carrying a Southern Cassowary chick and were told that its fate was to be raised in captivity and later sadly killed on a special occasion. Further on, we tried calling out a Hooded Pitta from the undergrowth to no avail but had more luck in the grassland around the airstrip where we happened upon a Barbanded Rail with chick. After lunch a trail through a good patch of forest at a new site took us to a clearing where we had good views of Greater Bird-of-paradise. Birding however was generally quiet, though we did come across some incredible butterflies and heard an elusive Hook-billed Kingfisher at dusk before heading back to our hotel for the night.

Day 17 (13.07.19): With only a little time before our flight to Port Moresby this morning, we headed to Km-17 for a final few hours' birding. After some delays and an eventual change of driver we finally arrived. Before too long we heard a Blue Jewel-babbler calling along the path; luring it in, it showed to some of the group for a brief few minutes before disappearing back into the undergrowth. Making our way through the forest we reached a known display site for King Bird-of-paradise, and enjoyed some time here watching the stunning male calling and displaying. Back to the hotel for a quick pack up, we were soon at the airport. Our flight was on time with an early arrival into Port Moresby, giving us time for a quick visit to Varirata before dusk. By now we were targeting species not yet seen, including Barred Owlet-nightjar that quickly responded to a little scratch on its roosting tree by popping its head out of its hole to investigate.

Day 18 (14.07.19): With this our final day in PNG we had a few hours to spare before most of us were due to report to the airport around noon for our international flights home. We decided to spend this at the PAU after breakfast at our lodge, in search of the Papuan Frogmouths that had eluded us on day 1. We were not having any luck until our driver called over to say he'd found some owls in a tree, which turned out to be our target birds! The sky was overcast and hoping for an improvement in the light to return for photographs we took a walk around the grounds. The ponds and trees held plenty of birds seen previously, but we did add a few final species including White bellied Cuckooshrike, Pied Heron and Plumed Whistling-duck before heading back to the airport for departure.

Black-headed Whistler *Pachycephala monacha* Seen in the Kumul area

White-bellied Pitohui *Pseudorectes incertus*A single bird seen on 10.07 during walks into the swamp forest at Kwatu

Little Shrikethrush *Colluricincla megarhyncha* *Heard around Ok Menga

Grey Shrikethrush *Colluricincla harmonica* Seen on the drive up to Varirata

Passeriformes: Laniidae Long-tailed Shrike *Lanius schach* Seen over the few days spent in Sirunki and Kumul

Passeriformes: Oriolidae

Australasian Figbird *Sphecotheres vieilloti* Seen in good numbers at Pacific Adventist University

Southern Variable Pitohui *Pitohui uropygialis* Seen on 06.07 & 07.07 at Ok Menga and Dablin Creek

Hooded Pitohui *Pitohui dichrous* A couple of birds seen at Varirata

Brown Oriole *Oriolus szalayi*A common bird seen at most sites

Passeriformes: Dicruridae

Spangled Drongo *Dicrurus bracteatus* Seen at Varirata, Ok Menga, Kwetu and Boyestown Rd.

Passeriformes: RhipiduridaeWillie Wagtail *Rhipidura leucophrys*Seen almost every day of the tour

Sooty Thicket Fantail *Rhipidura threnothorax* A single bird seen on 30.06 in the Sirunki area

Black Thicket Fantail *Rhipidura maculipectus* Seen in the Sirunki area

Black Fantail *Rhipidura atra* Seen in the highlands

Chestnut-bellied Fantail *Rhipidura hyperythra* Great views at Varirata

Friendly Fantail *Rhipidura albolimbata*Most commonly seen bird at Kumul lodge in the highlands

Dimorphic Fantail *Rhipidura brachyrhyncha* Seen at Sirunki and in the Kumul area

Rufous-backed Fantail *Rhipidura rufidorsa* Seen on 08.07 at Ok Menga

Passeriformes: Monarchidae

Spot-winged Monarch Symposiachrus guttula Seen in the swamp forests around Kwatu

Golden Monarch *Carterornis chrysomela* A brief glimpse at Ok Menga on 07.07

Frilled Monarch *Arses telescopthalmus* Seen on walks at Varirata and again at Kwatu

Torrent-lark *Grallina bruijnii* Seen above OK Menga on 08.07

Leaden Flycatcher *Myiagra rubecula* A single bird seen outside Varirata

Shining Flycatcher *Myiagra alecto*Seen in good numbers along the Elevala River

Grey Crow Corvus tristis
A few birds seen overhead while on the boat along the Fly River

Torresian Crow *Corvus orru*Commonly seen around Pt Moresby and Varirata

Blue-capped Ifrit *Ifrita kowaldi*A very special and sought-after

A very special and sought-after bird, seen on various occasions in Sirunki and exceptionally around Kumul lodge

Glossy-mantled Manucode *Manucodia ater* Seen at Boyestown Rd. and along the Fly River

Crinkle-collared Manucode *Manucodia halybatus*A few birds seen along the access road to Varirata, and again around Kiunga

Trumpet Manucode Phonygammus keraudrenii

A single bird seen along the Fly River

Ribbon-tailed Astrapia *Astrapia mayeri* Seen at Sirunki, Kumul lodge various other sites in the highlands

Princess Stephanie's Astrapia Astrapia stephaniae Quite a few seen with good views around Sirunki

Queen Carola's Parotia *Parotia carolae* Seen on both days at Dablin Creek

Lawes's Parotia *Parotia lawesii*One seen at Sirunki and another at Tonga village

King of Saxony Bird-of-paradise *Pteridophora alberti*A few of these extraordinary males and a few females were seen at Sirunki and a pair seen at Pigites, Kumul

Superb Bird-of-paradise *Lophorina superba* Seen a few males and females around Tonga village

Magnificent Riflebird *Ptiloris magnificus*A single female seen at the new site above Ok Menga

Growling Riflebird *Ptiloris intercedens*A female seen in the forest at Varirata on 28.06

Black Sicklebill *Epimachus fastosus*A nice male seen at Mt. Komonge ridge in Sirunki

Brown Sicklebill *Epimachus meyeri*A few seen at Sirunki and at the feeder station at Kumul

Magnificent Bird-of-paradise *Diphyllodes magnificus hunsteini*All birds seen were females; one at Kama village, and others at Dablin Creek

King Bird-of-paradise *Cicinnurus regius regius*Great views of both males and females on the walk at Km-17, Kiunga

Twelve-wired Bird-of-paradise *Seleucidis melanoleucus*Male and female birds showed well along the Elevala River

Greater Bird-of-paradise Paradisaea apoda

Males and females seen around the Ok Menga area on all visits there, a couple at Km-17 and flyovers at Boyestown Rd.

Raggiana Bird-of-paradise *Paradisaea raggiana*

One of the great highlights of the trip were the group of males displaying at Varirata on 28.06

Lesser Bird-of-paradise *Paradisaea minor* Excellent views of two males at Kama village

Torrent Flyrobin (Flycatcher) *Monachella muelleriana*The first few seen at Unada primary school near Kumul lodge and later along the river at Ok Menga

Canary Flyrobin (Flycatcher) *Microeca papuana*Nice views at Sirunki and at various sites around Kumul lodge

Lemon-bellied Flyrobin (Flycatcher) *Microeca flavigaster* Seen at Varirata

Garnet Robin *Eugerygone rubra* Seen on 02.07 at Sirunki

Hirundinidae: Swallows, MartinsPacific Swallow *Hirundo tahitica*A common swallow seen on most days

Phylloscopidae: Leaf Warblers & AlliesIsland Leaf Warbler *Phylloscopus poliocephalus*Seen at around Kumul Lodge

Megaluridae: Grassbirds and allies

Papuan (Tawny) Grassbird *Megalurus macrurus* A few birds seen at various sites while at Kumul Lodge

Zosteropidae: White-eyes

Black-fronted White-eye *Zosterops Chrysolaemus* A few seen at Varirata, Dablin Creek and Ok Menga

Green-fronted White-eye *Zosterops minor* Small numbers at Mt Komonge, Sirunki

New Guinea (Papuan) White-eye *Zosterops novaeguineae* A flock seen around Kumul lodge

Sturnidae: Starlings

Pygmy Drongo (Drongo Fantail) *Chaetorhynchus papuensis* Great views at Varirata on 28.06

Metallic Starling *Aplonis metallica*A few around Boyestown Rd., and along the Elevala River

Singing Starling Aplonis cantoroides

A few in the hospital grounds at Mumbisanda

Yellow-faced Myna Mino dumontii

A few seen at Pacific Adventist University and Port Moresby on 27.06, Varirata on 28.06, and later at Km-17 and Boyestown Rd.

Golden Myna *Mino Anais*A few seen along the Elevala River

Turdidae: Thrushes

Island Thrush *Turdus poliocephalus*Regularly seen at the feeder station at Kumul lodge

Muscicapidae: Chats, Old World Flycatchers

Pied Bush Chat Saxicola caprata Seen regularly in the highlands

Dicaeidae: Flowerpeckers

Red-capped Flowerpecker *Dicaeum geelvinkianum* Widespread and commonly seen

Nectariniidae: Sunbirds

Black Sunbird *Leptocoma sericea* Seen at the car park at Varirata on 28.06

Olive-backed Sunbird *Cinnyris jugularis* Quite commonly seen throughout

Passeridae: Old World Sparrows

House Sparrow *Passer domesticus* Seen in the hospital grounds at Mumbisanda

Eurasian Tree Sparrow *Passer montanus* Common at various sites

Estrildidae: Waxbills, Munias & Allies

Mountain Firetail *Oreostruthus fuliginosus*Some great views of a few birds in the grounds of Kumul lodge

Hooded Mannikin (Munia) *Lonchura spectabilis* Flocks seen around Sirunki and at various sites during our stay at Kumul lodge

Motacillidae: Pipits

Australian Pipit *Anthus australis* A few birds on the Mt Hagen airstrip
